HI-WAYS TO HEALTH by ADA R. MAYNE OREGON DAIRY COUNCIL

In every home where there are children there is the problem of seeing that they begin each day with an adequate breakfast - now that school days are here again. Breakfast is such an important meal. It is known definitely that breakfast influences the morning's school work, for too little food at breakfast will result in fatigue toward the end of the morning and the over fatigued child seldom displays much interest in class room activities. This same over fatigue results in a loss of appetite and too often means that the school lunch that has received serious attention and consideration from those planning it are not meeting the needs of the children. Lunch for the school child then should have the foundation of a good breakfast.

Certain foods are essential to the health of the growing child, and mothers should check up to see that these foods are not merely provided but are actually eaten by the child at every meal. The foods one must watch most closely are the protective foods - so-called because they protect and promote the health of the individual. So each day's menus must contain plenty of fresh vegetables and fruit, lots of nourishing butter, some whole grain cereal, an egg, and a full quart of milk for each child.

And from now on during the busy school year special emphasis should be put upon breakfast to see that children are not only fed adequately but that enough time

is provided that they will eat enough. Breakfast is so often eaten with an eye on the clock—the children have to get to school on time and the rest of the family to work - but the home maker must

see that the family does not hurry through the first meal of the day for life begins at breakfast.

Here is a dish that will be a good beginning for the school day: Oatmeal Cooked With Apples or Prunes

Four cups milk
One teaspoon salt
Two cups rolled oats
One and a half cups peeled chopped apples or cooked prunes
One third cup brown sugar
One half teaspoon cinnamon

Heat milk and salt to the boiling point in a saucepan. Stir the rolled oats into the milk slowly so that the milk does not stop boiling. Add the fruit and cook over a low flame until the mixture begins to thicken. Then set the pan over boiling water to cook until the fruit is tender, stirring frequently. Add brown sugar and cinnamon and serve at once. Serves six.

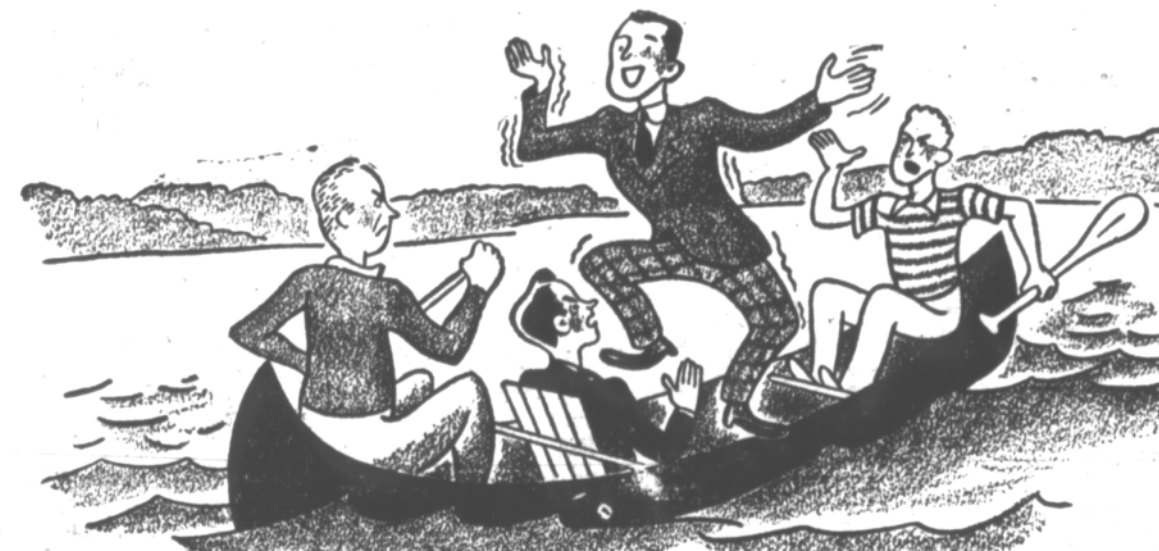
