

Razing of Old House Going On At G. V.

The Sam Bates house, first house in town from the north, has been bought by Edgar Alley from the county and is being partially torn down and all moved away. The old barn is also razed. Formerly on the main road and occupied in other days by many families for various purposes, some who stopped for long periods and some who dropped in for a brief harvest season, the house has long been vacant and was foreclosed for taxes last year. In bygone years, beyond recollection of all but the oldest of old timers, the half mile Grass Valley race track at one time passed in front of its location. That was VanWinkle's track that led up to the flat where the city pavilion park is now and was the main street of the first Grass Valley when business houses faced the creek.

Edgar Alley will make a granary of the old house and thus the physical scene changes and the big yellow rose bush will have nothing to climb on next year.

The Rogers rock crusher crew has been experimenting with sites for its next location and the men have been testing along the road between L. K. Smith's and Sam Stark's place.
