## Cheese a Healthy And Substantial Food Product

The flavor of cheese is different from that of any other food and the wide range in choice of cheese offers an almost endless variety of flavors in cheese. However, cheese is not just something to season or to flavor another food. Whole milk cheese is a substantial food in itself and to use plenty of cheese is to use more milk. It is rich in protein, fat, calcium, phosphorus and in vitamin A, just as milk is rich in these elements.

All cheese is made from milk; mainly cow's milk is used for making cheese in this country, and for making by far the most cheese in the world.

Because cheese is a concentrated form of milk, adults may use a part of their daily quota of milk in this form. One quart of fluid whole milk makes five ounces of American Cheddar Cheese. Thus one cup of milk is the equivalent in food value of one and a fourth or two small cubes of cheese.

Cheese is one of the few foods which is equally delicious when eaten just as it is purchased in markets or when cooked. It is a valuable addition to an oven dish, to a cream sauce, and even to some soups. Cheese must be cooked, however, at a low temperature if it is to keep its smooth texture.

The serving of an assortment of cheese with crackers in place of a sweet dessert is gaining favor. It is well to remember that if cheese is to be served as the dessert, the remainder of the meal may be lighter.

Here is a recipe for a vegetable casserole dish, made more delicious and nutritious by the cheese in it.

**Spanish Squash**  
One squash  
One medium sized onion, chopped  
Two tsp butter. Salt and pepper  
One teaspoon sugar  
Two cups cooked or canned tomatoes

One cup grated cheese  
One half cup buttered crumbs

Cut squash in cubes; remove seeds. Steam until almost tender; drain well. Cook onion in butter until a delicate brown. Add salt, pepper, sugar and tomato mixture; sprinkle with cheese. Continue until all ingredients are used. Cover top with buttered crumbs. Bake in hot oven about 20 minutes or until thoroughly heated.

For a dessert mash cream cheese and beat until light; add a few chopped nuts. Chill in refrigerator tray. Serve sliced with toasted crackers and coffee. Very good too with a fruit or green salad.
