## Fewer People Killed Per Million Miles

Despite a substantial increase in the use of motor vehicles in Oregon this year, the traffic death rate at the end of the first ten months was exactly even with the rate for the same period in 1940, Earl Snell, Secretary of State, disclosed today.

The rate is 11.1 persons killed per one hundred million miles of travel.

Since this death rate indicates the number of persons killed in relation to the exposure to accident, and since increase traffic volume means greater exposure to accident, the fact that the rate is no higher than it was last year when the exposure was less is an indication of the improvement in Oregon driving, Snell declared.

The October death rate this year was 12.7 while for the same month in 1940 it was 14.3. This improvement was effected in the face of an 18 percent increase in travel during the month.

October gasoline consumption amounted to 27,377,376 gallons, an increase of 4,162,433 gallons over 1940 October consumption. For the first ten months of the year, gas consumption totaled 251,324,777 gallons, or 14 percent more than the use for the corresponding period a year ago.

Gasoline consumption in Oregon has been setting new records every month this year with the

one exception of June. The reason of this exception, Snell explains, is that a year ago considerable gasoline was purchased in June in order to miss the federal tax which became effective July 1.
