Chinese Need Aid To Continue Fighting

Americans admire spunk! They have always been most willing to help those who, needing help, have helped themselves. And Americans have already made it plain that they want to help China see it through.

The only question is how to do it best. To answer that question clearly for all is the purpose of the campaign now being conducted by United China Relief. This organization has been set up in order to leave no doubt in American minds as to the most effective means of translating sympathy and admiration for China into concrete assistance.

In United China Relief the eight agencies which have heretofore financed the bulk of American relief and rehabilitation work in China have joined forces. Previously they have conducted separate appeals. Now there is only one appeal—the United China Relief.

China's urgent needs right now are for: medicines, anaesthetics, anti-toxins and vaccines; money for the food and shelter of refugees and orphans; money to finance industrial cooperatives; money to carry on and expand its educational facilities. These are the human needs of the new China. In sending aid to China at this time we shall be sending more than mere money. We will be extending our hand in a firm grasp of renewed friendship. We shall need that friendship for everyday that China fights on she is aiding us. We shall be giving the courageous Chinese the faith and will and hope to carry on.

The amazing purchasing power of American dollars in China makes one do the work of 20. One dollar will buy either for 20 surgical operations—many of which are now performed without anaesthetics. Five dollars will feed five children for one month; \$50 will start a gauze factory. The Chinese need every possible contribution large or small. require in our every day foods: given between meals. Creamed milk, vegetables and fruits, lean meat, fish and eggs; whole grain or enriched bread and cereals.

Calcium and iron are the two minerals most likely to be deficient in our ordinary meals unless we take thought and action to see that they are supplied. The richest sources of calcium are milk and dry types of cheese. Without milk or cheese in a form it is practically impossible to eat the tremendous bulk of other foods necessary to supply the body's daily need for calcium.

It does not matter in what form milk is taken. A pint of milk supplies nearly three fourths of the daily calcium allowance for an adult. A glass of milk at every meal for each child is the simplest and easiest way of being sure that the daily quota of one quart a day per child is absorbed, and the remaining glass used in cooking or

given between meals. Creamed vegetables, baked or escalloped dishes, puddings made of milk, ice cream and cottage cheese all offer a means of utilizing milk.

Cream of Corn Soup

One No. 1 can corn

One quart milk

Two tablespoons flour

Two table spoons butter

Half tsp salt, dash pepper

One slice onion

Cook the corn with the milk and onion in a double boiler for 30 minutes. Remove onion. Put the corn through a strainer, forcing as much through as possible. Melt the butter, add flour, and when smooth stir in hot mixture of milk and corn puree. Cook together slowly for a few minutes, and serve very hot with a spoonful of whipped cream if desired.

Irish Cream Soup

Three potatoes
One slice onion
Three tablespoons butter
Two cups milk
One eighth tsp pepper
One teaspoon of salt

Cook potatoes and onion soft. Remove the onion and mash potatoes. Meanwhile melt butter and add flour slowly to make a smooth paste. Gradually add the milk stirring constantly until it is quite thick and smooth. Stir in potatoes gradually. Serve piping hot sprinkled with minced parsley.
