Rural People Drive Most

Recent analysis of thousands of motor vehicle driving records is making known for the first time the transportation needs of 18,000,000 Americans living in unincorporated suburbs, villages or open areas, but not on farms, according to the Oregon State Motor Association.

No other group in the country, except farmers, has less access to mass transportation facilities. Many of them must drive daily to and from work in office or factory, and driving records indicate that this group, owning 13 per cent of all passenger cars, has a pattern of car usage all its own, the Association declared.

Annual mileage per car is 8,120, as contrasted with 5,728 miles for the farm car and 8,994 for the urban car. Percentage of necessity driving, predominantly trips to work and on business, is 62.6, comparable with the 66.8 per cent among farm cars.

While farm cars average only 388 trips, the non-farm rural cars average 513 and city cars 605. Besides making more frequent trips, the suburbanians average more miles per trip than the farm car, the analysis shows.

Less Money Needed

Reduced contributions on 1941 payrolls under the experience rating provisions of Oregon's unemployment compensation law were secured employers yesterday when the Social Security Board certified to the Secretary of Treasury the state agency as meeting requirements of the Internal Revenue code.

While the certification must be made annually, this is the first time the experience rating provisions have been included. Normal contribution rates of 2.7 per cent varied from 1 to 4 per cent on third quarter payrolls and from 1 to 2.7 per cent on fourth quarter payrolls.

The board's certification allows employers to take full 90 per cent credit offset against the federal tax of 3 per cent even though the actual contribution may have been lower than the usual 2.7 per cent. Administrator Silas Gaiser pointed out in explanation. To secure this offset, employers must complete payments on 1941 payrolls on or before January 31, 1942.
