Mrs. Clara Baker, widow of L. W. Baker, who died in 1919, died at the home of her daughter near Goldendale and was buried at Grass Valley Thursday afternoon.

Mrs. Baker was born in Iowa and came to Sherman county about 1910, remaining here until the 20s. She is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Nora Moore, two sons, Lloyd, now in California and Elva of Goldendale, and brothers, Roy of Gresham, Bert of Portland, Sam of Grants Pass.

Members of the American Legion and Auxiliary were in charge of the funeral and Legionnaires were pallbearers. Hanley-Baker post was named in part for her son, Henry Baker, who was killed in France.

Hunting Season Still Planned

Plans are underway for the State Game Commission to formulate regulations regarding hunting of large and small game when it holds its regular meeting for purpose in June.

The Commission expects to have open seasons for both game animals and game birds this fall and with this end in view, is sending out crews of men to make a survey of conditions affecting the game population in order to have data upon which to base its orders at the June meeting. The big game survey in eastern Oregon that has been underway for several weeks and the work of the ground crew has been supplemented by use of an airplane for the purpose of spotting the heavier concentrations of deer and elk.

Tax Stamp Loss

Although lost or stolen federal motor vehicle use tax stamps will not be replaced free of charge, the Bureau of Internal Revenue has established a procedure to relieve owners from purchasing a second stamp in such cases, the Oregon State Motor Association has learned.

The procedure involves proof of original payment through mailing of the post card supplied at the time and a detailed affidavit acceptable to the District Collector of Internal Revenue. If satisfied, the collector will give the owner a statement acceptable to officers as evidence of payment of the tax.

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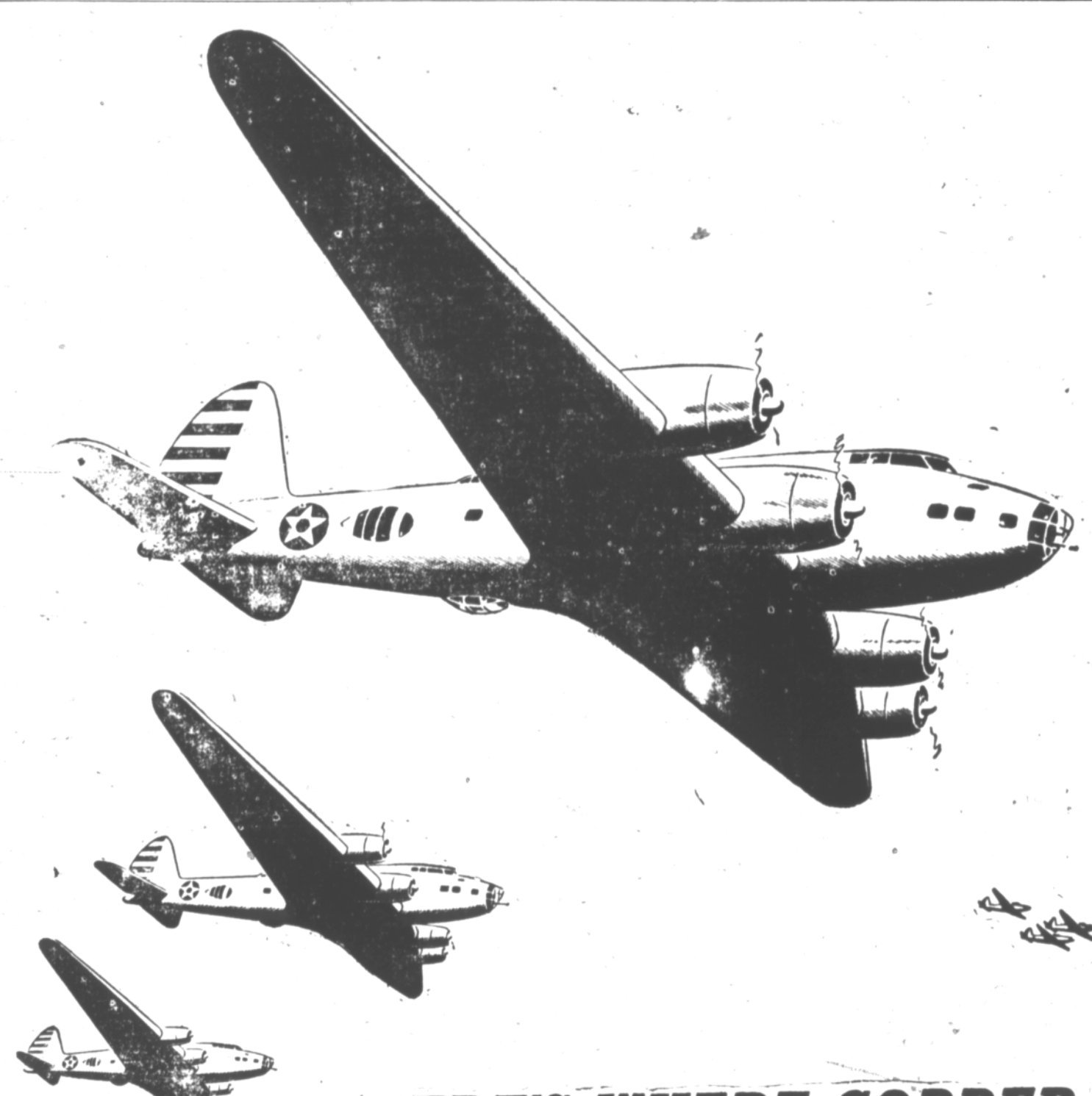
