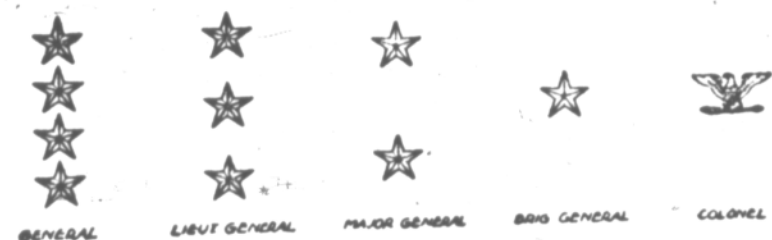

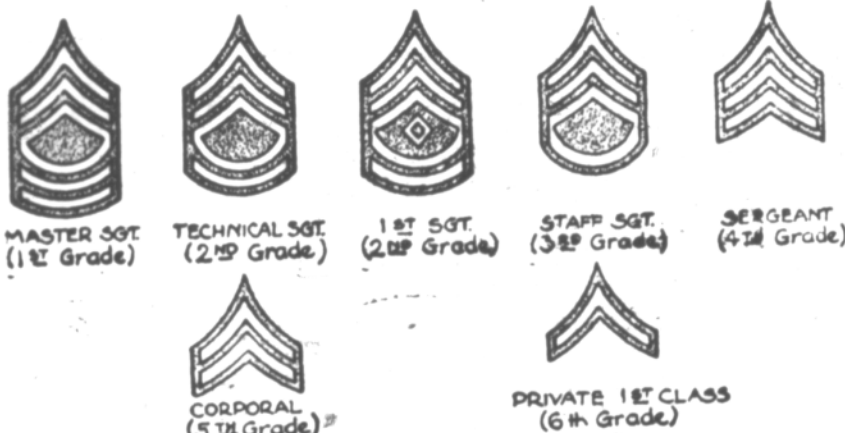


U.S. Army Insignia of Rank

About That Birth Certificate Every One Is Worrying Over

Five years ago, when Hitlerism was a wholly academic issue to the great majority of Americans, relatively few of them sensed that they might some day be called upon not only to prove that they were born but to prove that they were born under the American flag. In those days the Oregon State Board of Health considered that it was being snowed under if it received as many as 200 applications for delayed certificates of birth within a single year. Now, 200 applications would be a single morning's work for the registration staff of the Board's vital statistics division in Portland.

Today, good Americans by the tens of millions are attempting to dig up substantial proof—proof acceptable as evidence in a court of law, if need be—of something that has been perfectly obvious to their friends right along. They are encountering difficulties and delays and they are blaming these difficulties and delays on to everything except their own inability to supply reasonably conclusive evidence. The commonest complaint is that the state, county and city agencies issuing birth certificates are deliberately imposing restrictions and that the red-tape boys are having a Roman holiday. But in point of fact, there are few gov-

ernmental procedures from which red tape has been cleared away more completely.

A uniform procedure for the issuance of delayed birth certificates was worked out by the Federal Census Bureau and its adoption was urged upon the states in April of last year. The manual of uniform procedure recommended that delayed certificates be issued on the basis of (1) two independent class A records (i. e., records established before the fourth birthday of the registrant), or (2) three independent class B records (i. e., records issued on or after the fourth birthday of the registrant and at least five years prior to the date when application is made.) Also given was a list of the types of evidence, in the order of preference. This list is as follows: (1) hospital records, (2) physician's record, (3) record from a census, (4) family Bible record, (5) church record, (6) school record, (7) insurance policy, (8) army, navy or marine discharge, (9) other types of documents such as driver's license, marriage record, voting registration record, etc., and (10) affidavit of physician or "interested" party.

At the same time a new and much simplified form of certificate was worked out and submitted to

the local agencies with the recommendation that it be generally adopted. The Oregon State Board of Health, which is responsible for the recording and issuance of delayed certificates in this state, has adopted the federal government's recommendations in every detail. Our form of certificate is, word for word, the one suggested by the Federal government. Our procedures are the ones outlined in the manual.

The suggestion has been made that the uniform manual still allows the individual states considerable leeway. This is, to some extent, true. But it should be noted that employment offices are likewise given just as much leeway in determining whether or not a certificate submitted to them actually does constitute reasonably conclusive evidence of American citizenship. All manufacturers of aircraft working on government orders were enjoined by law in 1920 against giving an employee of alien citizenship access to plans or specifications. In 1940 this federal prohibition was extended to cover all defense industries. Subsequently the war and navy departments, in a joint statement, asked all defense industries not to employ in any capacity workers who are unable to establish that they are citizens.

The criticism is frequently made that relatively little weight is given to the affidavit of a parent. Quite true, a parent SHOULD know when his child was born and where. But unfortunately, this type of affidavit is one that can be easily and deliberately falsified. And while 99 per cent of the people would not do such a thing, there is one person who would. And it is this one percent that the federal government means, if humanly possible, to keep out of our vital defense industries for this one percent includes most of the potential saboteurs.

Obviously, then, if certificates were issued willy-nilly on the unsupported affidavit of a parent, there would be little point in issuing them at all. The entire system of checks and precautions would instantly break down. Any one could obtain a certificate simply by having someone write out a "parent's" affidavit and then having it sworn to before a notary. Not that most people would do such a thing; but this point we stress again—some would and some to our definite knowledge, actually have done.

The Oregon State Board of Health really wants to issue certificates that will be acceptable to any employer, to provide legal documents acceptable as evidence in a court of law if ever needed for such a purpose. It issues certificates on the unsupported affidavit of parents or other "interested" party only as a last resort. But it does issue such certificates.

It is entirely up to the individual employer whether or not he regards such certificates as being reasonably conclusive evidence of American citizenship. Because a large proportion of those securing such certificates subsequently return to our office with the complaint that they have been rejected at an employment office, we desire sincerely to issue, whenever humanly possible, certificates that really will hold water.

The delays over which there have been many complaints are due, first, to the fact that applicants for certificates come to our office insufficiently prepared; second, to the fact that our staff is undermanned and overworked handling 700 pieces of mail every day in addition to the throngs of people who apply in person, and third, to the fact that needless congestion is being caused by the thousands of people who are applying for delayed certificates without really needing them.

To remedy this situation, the Board of Health has already greatly simplified the procedures in accordance with the Federal government's recommendations; it has enlarged its staff still further, and is requiring all applicants to state why they want certificates at this time.

SPECIAL NUMBERS COST MORE IN FLORIDA

Issuance of special automobile license numbers, a free service which has grown to large proportions in Oregon, is now being taxed in Florida in the latest angle in automobile registration. The Oregon State Motor Association reports.

All Sunshine State motorists who want license numbers to match their address, telephone number, class in college, or whatever you will be required to pay an additional \$1 in registration fees, the revenue to go to support of dependent children.

With the Lenten season at hand the home maker will be looking for dishes that will satisfactorily take the place of meat in the menu. Meat is a high protein food. Therefore, if meat is left out of the diet, we must be sure to make up the quota with other, high protein foods.

We have milk and cheese to choose from; sea foods of all kinds; eggs and legumes - a large group of foods that offer endless possibilities for meatless dishes that are appetizing and satisfying. Dairy products used with meat substitutes are invaluable in their protein and mineral content. All in all - when there is this change in the daily menu planning, the important thing is that the changes are equal in their benefits to health.

Streamliners, refrigeration and the whiz of modern freezing land fish in the markets as firm, sweet and full flavored as at the moment of catching. And the canned varieties - fresh packed in all their goodness - are ready for creaming, scalloping, making into pies, souffles and omelets.

But fish sinks or swims on the company it keeps for fish needs things sharp and piquant. Few foods combine as well together as do fish as cheese. Grated cheese adds to casserole dishes and a smooth sharp cheese sauce will add new interest to ordinary dishes.

Cheese, vegetables, cream, with a snappy dressing, tart sauces - these do big things for fish and eager appetites. Here is a recipe for a frozen white relish to serve with baked fish; and a cheese sauce that will make any dish more tempting.

Frozen White Relish

One cup heavy cream
One cup prepared horse-radish
One teaspoon of lemon juice
One half teaspoon salt
Two tablespoons minced parsley
Two tablespoons chopped pimiento

Whip the cream until it will hold its shape. Fold in the other ingredients. Place in the freezing tray. Stir once during the freezing process.

Cheese Sauce

Two tablespoons butter
Two tablespoons flour
One half cup grated sharp cheese
One cup milk
One fourth tsp dry mustard
One half tsp Worcestershire sauce

Melt the butter in saucepan; add the flour and stir until smooth. Gradually add milk and cook until smooth and thick, stirring constantly. Blend the cheese, mustard, and Worcestershire sauce and stir into the hot white sauce. Serves 4 to 6.

Feathers Now On Short List

Your youngsters won't have any more slam-bang, rousing pillow fights, with feathers floating all over the room. Pillows are precious. From now on, goose and duck feathers may be used only for filling defense orders. Even civilian orders now on hand cannot be filled. As it is, the overworked

ducks can't keep up with the army and navy needs for sleeping bags and aviators' flying suits. In pre-war days the United States imported quantities of the stuffing for pillows and comforters from Europe, but the bulk of the supply came from China. Even lowly chicken feathers are at a premium. Kapok, too, has been strictly reserved for military use and a few essential civilian needs, such as lifesaving appliances. So now it looks as though we won't even be able to "sleep as usual."
