Crop Insurance Heed Growing

Nearly half of the state's 1942 wheat crop will be protected against all risks by federal crop insurance, Clyde Kiddle, crop insurance assistant at the state AAA office, has just announced. Crop insurance will be in effect on the greatest number of farms since its introduction four years ago.

A total of 3802 applications for insurance have been received, covering 1942 wheat production on 6123 farms—1432 more than last year—Kiddle reported. An estimated production of over six million bushels on nearly 350,000 acres will be covered by crop insurance, he said.

Winter wheat policies were written last fall for 5676 farms, and applications for spring wheat insurance on 547 farms were received in February, final reports show.

Insurance will be in effect in 26 counties. Umatilla has the largest number of farms, 1051 covered. Clackamas county is second with production insured on 814 farms.

Kiddle credited simplification of forms, introduction of a convenient note premium payment plan and a growing awareness of the protection afforded as reasons for the increase.

"Every thing from birds to bugs took a bite out of Oregon's 1941 wheat crop," Kiddle said. "Nearly 1,300 claims were paid for 19 causes of loss, with plant diseases in western Oregon taking the largest toll. As more growers realize that crop insurance is protection against all hazards, more of them are deciding that they can't afford to be without it."

Women's Hose Now Mixture

Women's hosiery being manufactured now frequently is made of a combination of materials requiring more care in washing and drying, says Miss Lucy R. Lane, extension specialist in clothing and textiles at Oregon State college.

One instance is the combined rayon and nylon hosiery. Where these are made with a nylon leg and rayon top and foot, the nylon portion absorbs little moisture and dries more quickly than the rayon, even though the latter may appear dry.

Because rayon loses some of its tensile strength when wet, damage is frequently caused by wearing the hose before the rayon portions are completely dry. The weakened rayon will not stand the strain of fastening under such conditions, says Miss Lane. Furthermore, the nylon fiber, being stronger than the wet rayon, is likely to cut through the rayon fiber where the leg portion joins the foot or the top. The trouble can be avoided by making sure that the hose are completely dry before using.
