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Governor Points To Record On Tax Matters

Faced with a demand that he take action to postpone the date in which state income taxes must be paid, Governor Charles A. Sprague announced that while he was friendly to the idea, he doubted his legal ability to arrange the requested extension and would act only if the attorney general advised that such a program was legal.

The governor directed attention to the fact that the new state law provides that in the future real tax payments shall be made in the fall, thus relieving the situation that sponsors of the income tax postponement seek to correct. He announced his purpose to advocate a reduction by at least 20 percent of the income tax rate, and gave the following points as tax accomplishments of his administration.

1. Eliminated all property taxes for state purposes.
2. Eliminated a two mill levy for the elementary school fund.
3. Eliminated a one-half mill levy for retirement of veterans' aid commission bonds.
4. Has taken over from the counties all their share of the administrative cost of public welfare.
5. Has absorbed 20 percent of the counties share of providing old age assistance and care of dependent children and the blind. During the last biennium this item exceeded \$3,000,000.

6. Reduced the bonded indebtedness of the state by more than \$10,000,000.

7. Paid off more than \$377,000 worth of outstanding certificates of indebtedness on liquor revenues issued to finance public welfare.

8. Improved the condition of the state treasury from a deficit of \$210,000 to a surplus of better than \$2,500,000.

identify them, how to control them.

6. Gas attacks, how they may occur, what you can do.

The Oregon State Defense council estimated that the possible case of Jap bombers raiding a metropolitan area from a naval carrier operating off the coast could drop 50,000 incendiary bombs. Approximately 5,000 fires would result from these bombs.

Emphasizing the need for Oregonians to learn how to combat incendiary bombs, particularly, Jerrold Owen, state coordinator of civilian defense said that civilians could control 95 out of 100 fires resulting from incendiaries, if they obtained equipment and practiced instructions listed in the "Official Air Raid Instruction" manual. This would still leave the local fire department of a large metropolitan area more than 250 fires to control, if 50,000 incendiary bombs were unloaded.
