HI-WAYS TO HEALTH by ADA R. MAYNE OREGON DAIRY COUNCIL

Children must be well nourished if they are to be healthy. Children, growing fast, studying and playing hard, need foods that build strong bones and sound teeth; foods that build tissue and make red blood and furnish energy.

To be well fed, growing boys and girls need three nourishing meals a day, served at regular hours. About one third of the day's food should be given at each meal. Start the day with a good breakfast. If there is any difference in the amount served at the other two meals, it is usually better to give the heavier meal at noon.

The amount of food a child eats depends on how much exercise and fresh air he has had and how tired he is. A tired child cannot eat. If the meals are well spaced and planned so that they give the same amount of nourishment at each meal, a child usually will not want anything between meals. If he does ask for food, something simple should be given him like a glass of milk and a cookie, or an apple or orange.

We know that milk stands high in food value. Children should have 3 to 4 glasses or more of milk every day. A glass with each

meal is the safe rule to follow and then with milk used generously in cooking, there is little reason for the child not to get this required daily amount.

Milk, more than any other single food, lends itself to making tasty and appetizing combinations with other foods. Creamed and escalloped dishes, cream soups, milk puddings and custards are only a few ways to use milk and all are nourishing dishes suitable for family meals and growing children. Here is a ricepudding a bit different and one the whole family will enjoy.

Molasses Rice Pudding
Six tsp washed rice
Two and a fourth cups milk
Three eggs, separated
One fourth tsp salt
One fourth cup molasses
One half tsp cinnamon
One fourth granulated sugar

Cook rice in milk in double boiler for 1 hour; stirring occasionally. Beat egg yolks; add salt, molasses and cinnamon. Add hot rice mixture gradually while stirring; return to double boiler, and cook 2 minutes. Cool slightly. Beat egg whites stiff; add sugar slowly, while continuing to beat; then fold into pudding. Chill. Serves 6.

Anyhow, men ought to get together and be friends. That's the way we were made. Why not try it more often—all of you?

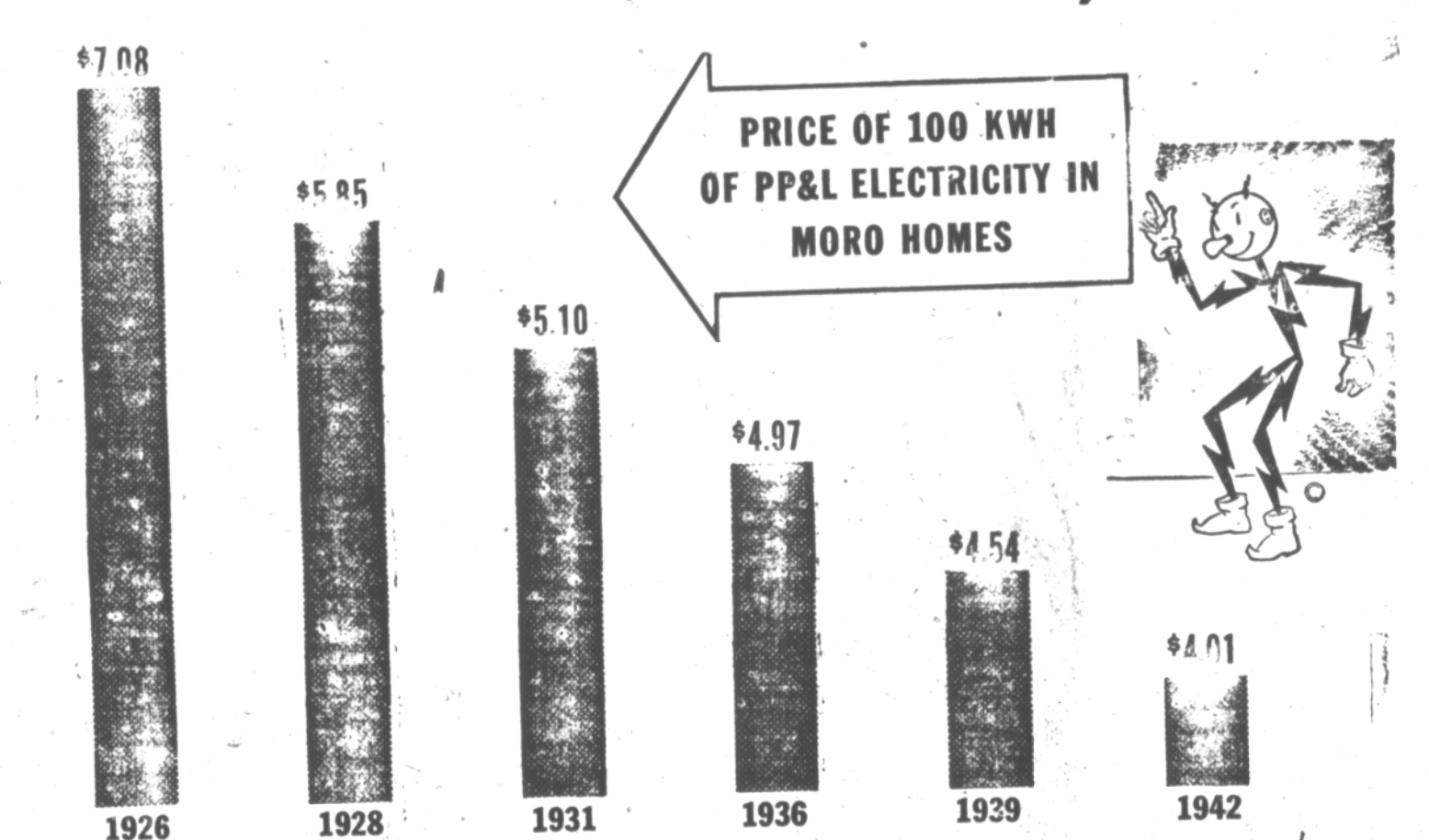
