Edwin Balsiger is at Centerville, Washington where he will spend the summer with his Aunt Pat and Uncle Happy.

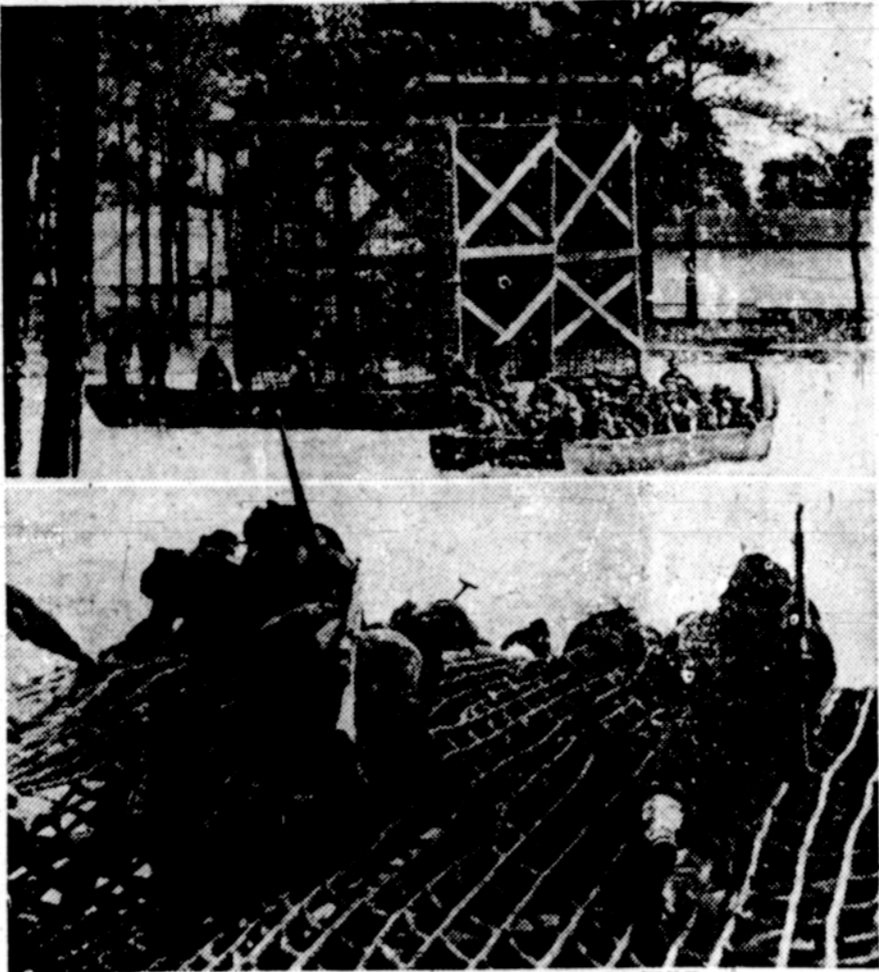
Mrs. Theodore Johnston and Mrs. Orlo Martin are in Portland to attend the Grand Lodge of the Odd Fellows and Rebekahs.
