**HI-WAYS TO HEALTH**

Have you been sleuthing for slimming vitamins? It is at the beginning of the summer season when women are looking longingly at play clothes and bathing suits that they want to whittle down their silhouette.

Lucky is the person who can find no fault with his or her weight. So if you want to change the proportions of your own figure, look to the kind and amounts of food you are eating. But keep in mind that no radical weight reducing program should be attempted without the advice of a competent doctor - there are too many health questions involved.

It must be remembered that certain foods should be kept in the diet regardless of how many other are eliminated to reduce the present weight. Fresh milk, vegetables and fruits are called the protective foods because they are particularly rich in those dietary essentials which protect the health of the body. While these foods should be a part of every one's meals, it is important that they be present in a reducing diet so that the daily loss of weight will not

impair health.

Milk is essential in any reducing diet - it is one of nature's most important factors in retaining youthful vitality. It builds up strength, repairs worn tissues, rejuvenates sagging muscles and tones up the entire system. So we are giving recipes for two milk drinks - all calculated to slim you down - and build you up.

**Orange Quench**  
Three fourths cup milk  
One fourth cup orange juice  
One teaspoon sugar  
Combine ingredients, beat with an egg beater until thoroughly blended and serve chilled. Variation: Add one fourth teaspoon cinnamon for Spiced Orange Milk.

**Tomato Juice Cocktail**  
One and a half cups of chilled tomato juice  
One cup chilled milk  
One fourth teaspoon celery salt  
One half teaspoon salt  
Dash black pepper  
Pour the tomato juice into the milk stirring vigorously. Add seasoning. Serve immediately in chilled glasses. Yield: 4 servings.
