Civil Service Wants More Investigators

Investigators to perform investigations work for Federal agencies are being sought through an announcement released today by the United States Civil Service Commission. The salary is \$2,600 a year. It is expected that positions will be filled in Washington, D. C., and throughout the United States. Appointees will probably be in a travel status for the greater part of the time. The work will be of a confidential character. In which the investigator must meet and confer with individuals in all walks of life. The data developed must be assembled in written reports.

Experience is required either in making investigations in connection with the prosecution of civil or criminal cases, in the general practice of law, which included court presentation or investigation in preparing cases for trial, or in responsible positions which required the exercise of fact and independent judgment in meeting and dealing with the public. Education completed in an accredited college may be substituted for a part of the experience. Persons with legal education and appropriate experience are particularly desired.

Applicants must be at least 25 and not over 55 years. A written test will be given to competitors to determine their aptitude for learning and adjusting to the duties in the service. Applications must be filed with the Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., and will be accepted until the needs of the service have been met.
