Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Crews and daughter and Robert Schilling were business visitors in The Dalles Friday.

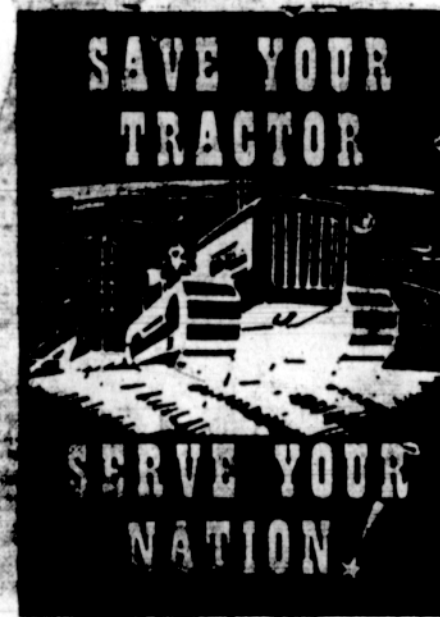

HI-WAYS TO HEALTH by ADA R-MAYNE OREGON DAIRY COUNCIL

The impression many people have that no benefits are derived from improved food habits in people past 40 years of age should be immediately dispelled. It is now well known that, even at this late date, the right foods can make a great difference in the health, morale and comfort of adults of any age.

From studies made there seems to be a relationship between the amounts of protective foods - milk, fruit, vegetables and eggs - in the diet and the degenerative diseases in middle aged people. In other words, the more protective foods eaten, the fewer cases of these diseases were found.

Attacks of indigestion and constipation in adults are often the direct results of poor food selection. A choice of foods that includes more protein, vitamins and minerals often prevent these illnesses which means again the generous use of milk, fruits, vegetables and eggs.

Studies have shown too, that brittle and easily broken bones of elderly people may be due largely to an inadequate amount of milk in the diet over a long period of years, resulting in a calcium deficiency. Adults should have a pint of milk every day to avoid this calcium shortage.

Although better results are obtained when a good diet has been the rule all through life it is never too late to start. Even in elderly people, the right foods should aid greatly in promoting less susceptibility to colds and minor infections, more protection for the eyes, better digestion and more comfort.

Both physical exercise and internal bodily activities are usually lessened in elderly people, and their needs for energy foods, such as fats, sweets, bread and cereals may be sharply reduced. But the need for protective foods continues.

through life and great care should be taken to see that these foods are provided every day. Here is a recipe for Prune Souffle that combines the protective foods milk, fruit and eggs.

Prune Souffle
Two tablespoons of butter
Three tablespoons flour
One cup milk
One-half cup granulated sugar
Three eggs

Two thirds cup unsweetened strained prune pulp
One tablespoon lemon juice

Melt butter in saucepan over slow heat, stir in flour; add milk, stirring constantly, and cook until thickened. Remove from heat, add prune pulp, sugar and lemon juice. Cool slightly. Separate eggs and add egg yolks, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition. Beat egg whites until stiff, but not dry, and fold carefully into first mixture. Pour into a casserole, place in a pan of hot water and bake in a moderately hot oven (375 degrees) for 45 to 50 minutes. Makes 4 servings.
