HI-WAYS TO HEALTH

Statistics show that cottage cheese is steadily increasing in popularity all over the country. It is an excellent and inexpensive way to get protein into the diet, and it rates as a good source of calcium and phosphorus. Cottage cheese is economical for the same reason that milk is economical—namely, because it gives maximum food value for minimum cost.

Favorite summer uses for bland cottage cheese are for salads and sandwiches. Salads in which cottage cheese is combined with fruits and vegetables make satisfactory meals when accompanied by hot buttered rolls and a beverage. The cheese may be seasoned with salt and pepper, with a bit of mayonnaise, or with chili sauce or catsup. Plain onion juice is a good seasoner too—in fact, almost any rather strong flavored vegetable goes well with the mild cheese.

Here are two tasty cottage cheese recipes—a honey cheese dressing and a cheese ring filled with fruit—and any fresh fruit combination will do. Both of these recipes are easy on your sugar.

Cottage Cheese Ring

1 tbsp gelatine
1-4 cup cold water
2 cups cottage cheese
3-4 tsp salt
1-8 tsp paprika
1-4 cup top milk
1 head lettuce
1-2 cup pineapple
6 dates, 1 orange 1 cup of strawberries or bananas.

Soak gelatine in cold water and dissolve over hot water. Mash cheese fine, add seasonings, top milk and gelatine. Turn into border-or ring mold. When firm un-mold on lettuce and fill center with fruit, which has been cut in small pieces and mixed with salad dressing, to which has been added a few spoonful of whipped cream that each addition is well blended. Add remaining oil 2 tablespoons at a time. This makes a delicious dressing for fruit salads or avocados. Makes 1 1-4 cups.
