Gertrude Gillmor is expected home this weekend from Condon where she has been working in the bank. She has been transferred to the Sellwood branch.

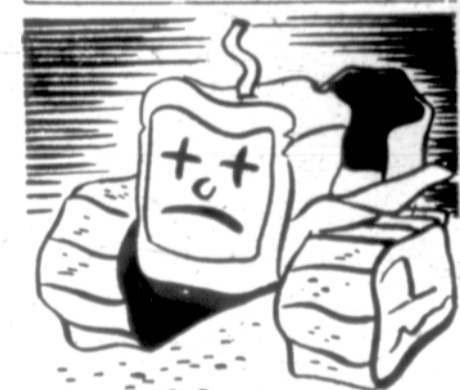
Mrs. Orville Thogerson is here this week from her home in Prineville to visit with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Seral Searcy.
