Men's Rubber Boots To Be Rationed

Rationing men's rubber boots and rubber work shoes became effective September 30. This type of footwear requires such important quantities of crude rubber that it has been necessary to cut production to the bone. However the War Production Board has given assurance that allotments will be made to cover all essential needs.

To allay any fears among consumers, it should be pointed out that most types of rubber footwear, such as men's overshoes, work and dress rubbers, women's and children's boots, galoshes, gaiters and rubbers, are not rationed. By use of substitutes and reclaimed rubber, it is possible to make this type of footwear with a small percentage of crude rubber. Because of this fact, it is not expected that there will be a shortage of these non-rationed types of footwear.

Men's rubber boots and rubber work shoes have now been frozen until Monday, Oct. 5, after which time the local war price and rationing boards will issue certificates for the purchase of these articles to workers in essential industries who can show a definite need for this protection.

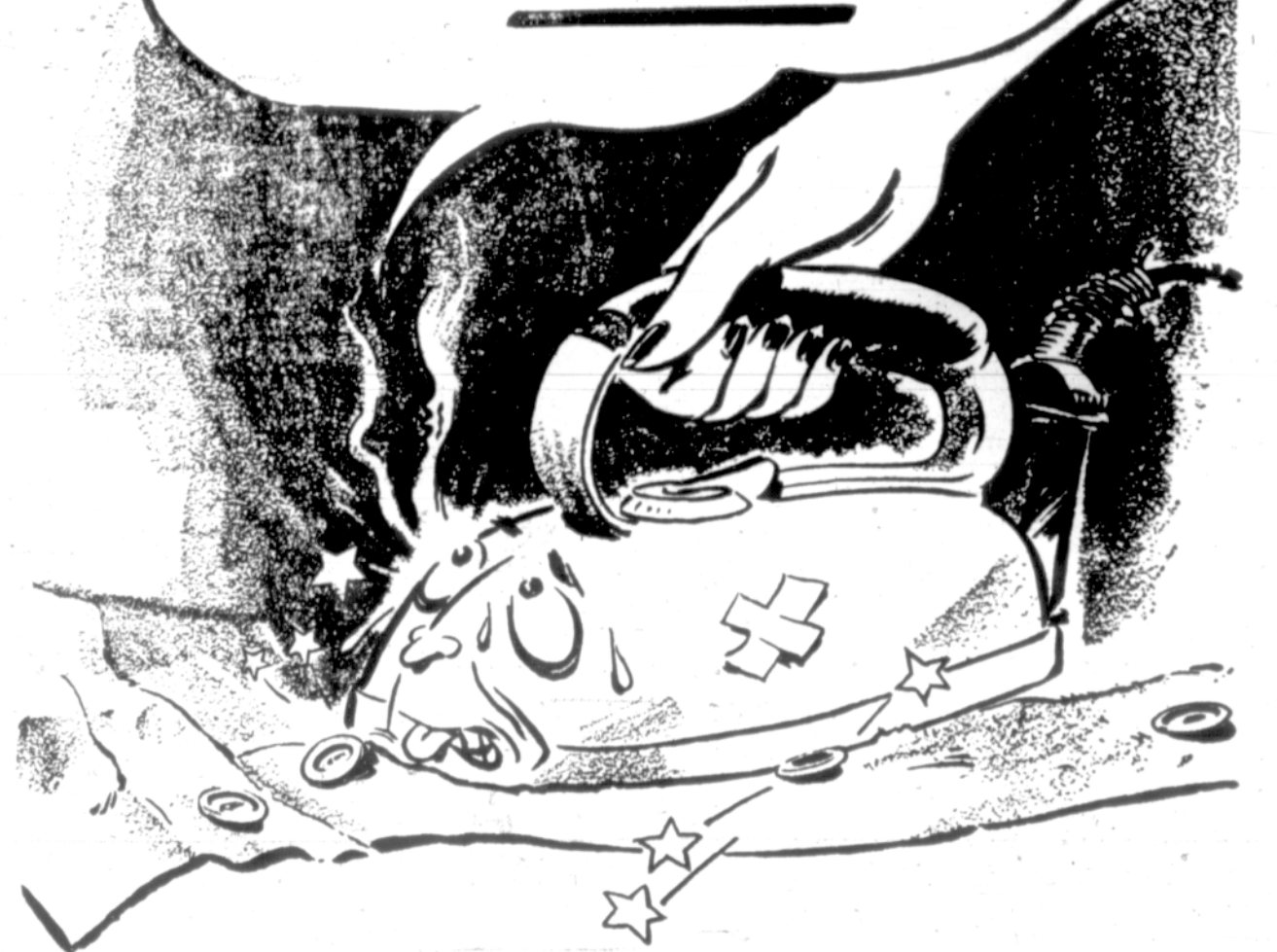
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
