IT PAYS TO GROW HOGS

Oregon farmers are asked to consider the national 1943 hog goal calling for a 10 percent increase as a minimum goal, and to set their pork production sights for next year at the maximum capacity of each farm plant.

The request comes from R. B. USDA war board, who points out Taylor, chairman of Oregon's that while Secretary Wickard has asked for a 1943 spring pig crop 10 percent greater than last spring's record 165 million pigs, Oregon is in a position to make an even larger contribution to the United Nations critical meat needs.

Possibilities for increasing pork production in the state are seen as excellent by A. W. Oliver, hog specialist at OSC. Feed supplies are plentiful, farm facilities for raising more hogs are adequate, and feed costs and hog prices will probably stay close to the present extremely favorable ratio, Oliver believes.

The government feed wheat program assures hog producers of a continuing supply of feed at a moderate price, Oliver said, adding that many Oregon farmers are finding wheat considerably superior to corn for feeding hogs as college feeding tests have demonstrated.

Taylor points out that producers may plan now to increase their operations without fear of unfavorable prices at marketing time next fall. The new anti-inflation law provides that no ceiling can be set on farm products at less than the higher of the parity price received by farmers during the January 1-September 15, 1942 period.

The 10 percent increase requested by the secretary of agriculture is expected to provide 23 billion pounds more pork. But pork requirements of the armed forces, lend-lease and civilians are increasing proportionately, Taylor said, and every pound of pork above the goal will be an extra contribution toward winning the war.
