PLANNING MEALS IN WAR—In normal times, the homemaker who was conscientious about planning meals which would protect the health of her family was guided by three basic rules: the use of enough of each of the right foods to meet the needs of each member of her family; the preparation and serving of these foods so attractively that the family would eat them; and keeping the cost of the foods within the family budget. In wartime, these principles are as important as ever, but the homemaker must think of several other factors if she is going to do her part in helping to produce the war effort to the utmost. She must use abundant foods and Victory food specials in so far as this enables her to follow the rules of good nutrition and keep within her food budget. She must use locally grown foods as much as possible to relieve transportation facilities which are needed for the moving of troops and war goods. She must put emphasis on the use of seasoned foods. This helps to relieve the local markets and regulate prices and saves previously canned foods which may be needed urgently at a future time. She must conserve cooking fuel to help save fuel for war production purposes. The home

maker who faithfully practices all these rules will be having a large share in maintaining the home front.

Among the abundant foods on the home market is cheese. The government is asking each family to use an additional quarter-pound of cheese each week. The recent scarcity of meat and its higher cost have sent many women to their recipe books looking for suggestions for main meals without meat to serve on two or three days each week. Cheese, eggs, dried beans and peas are the foods which will supply protein, one of the chief factors in meat. Nourishing, satisfying meals can be provided if they are supplemented with milk, vegetables, fruits and other foods.

Here is a recipe for Cheese Fondue which can be used as the main dish for one of the meatless days.

2 cups dry bread, 2 cups milk, 1-2 tsp salt, 1-2lb American cheese, 2 eggs, 1 tbsp butter.

Break bread into small pieces. Add milk and grated cheese. Cook over boiling water until cheese is melted. Add slowly to beaten egg yolks. Add salt and butter, fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour into a buttered pan and bake in a moderate oven until firm—30 to 40 minutes. For 6.
