We have recently had it brought forcibly to our attention that we cannot expect to have a railroad indefinitely if we do not use it.

The same thing is true of our businesses, local businesses and others. There isn't any written rule about it. It is just an economic law. We either patronize local stores and other local services or they will go to the shipyards, the cities or down the dirt road, depending on the state of national prosperity.

We have gradually lost several businesses with as much value to the county as the railroad. The loss has been slow and broken up into smaller matters so the loss has not attracted the attention the threatened loss of the railroad did.

Sherman county is a fine place to live. It is a good place to do business. The people are fine folks. BUT businessmen cannot stay without business.

We cannot keep places to buy hardware, dry goods, groceries unless we use them. We cannot keep machine shops, service stations, banks or even newspapers unless we use them. Despite the recent victory over the railroad we cannot keep it indefinitely without we use it. In fact, we don't deserve to.
