Over the Top by New Year's Is the Plea of Secretary Morgenthau

November 13, 1942

As of today twenty-one million American workers are investing eight per cent of their salary - every pay day - in United States War Savings Bonds. This is a very remarkable tribute to our armed forces who are fighting this war. But this job is only two-thirds accomplished.

Victory Garden Program To Continue

The second annual victory garden conference to lay plans for continuing wartime expansion of home production of vegetables and small fruits has been called by William A. Schoenfeld, dean and director of agriculture, to meet at Oregon State college, Friday, December 4. Representatives of 16 state organizations have been invited to participate with the OSC extension service.

The 1942 Oregon victory garden program has been remarkably successful, says Dean Schoenfeld, but a still greater need looms for more victory gardens in 1943. It is hoped that out of the experiences of the past year considerable improvement can be included in the program for the coming year.

The program for the conference calls for discussions during the forenoon session, followed by appointment of working committees to meet in the early afternoon and the adoption of their reports comprising a complete program.

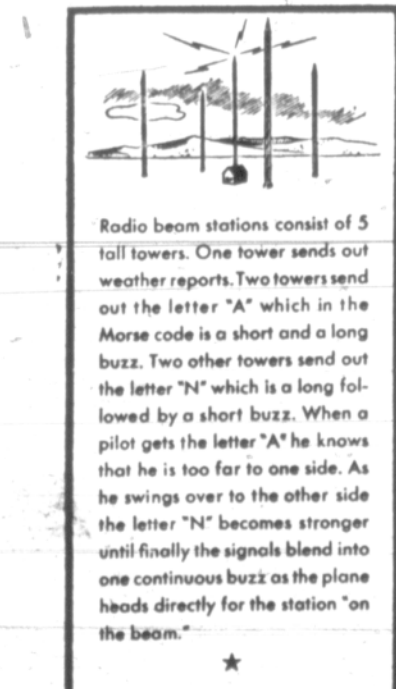

Radio beam stations consist of 5 tall towers. One tower sends out weather reports. Two towers send out the letter "A" which is a long buzz. Two other towers send out the letter "N" which is a long buzz followed by a short buzz. When a pilot gets the letter "A" he knows that he is too far to one side.
