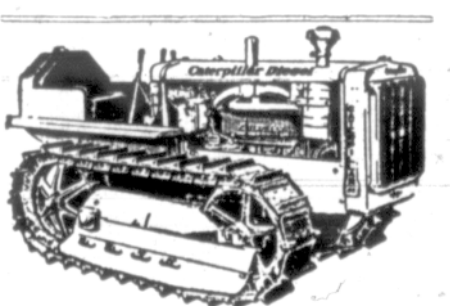
Joe Weatherford is taking a two week vacation and spending it with relatives visiting the Mee family in The Dalles and Mrs. J. Nichols near Heppner.

Gas Dealers Still Hang On

An anticipated heavy drop in the number of gasoline pumps licensed for 1943 has failed to show up in returns received up to November 19 by the license division of the state department of agriculture. There has been, however, about a 50 percent drop in non-gasoline licenses issued All gas and non-gas pumps in the state are subject to a yearly license fee, which the department collects by mail.

So far, undeliverable application forms—indicating that the station is out of business—have not been many more than at this period last year. However, returns slower in coming in may change the picture, officials say.

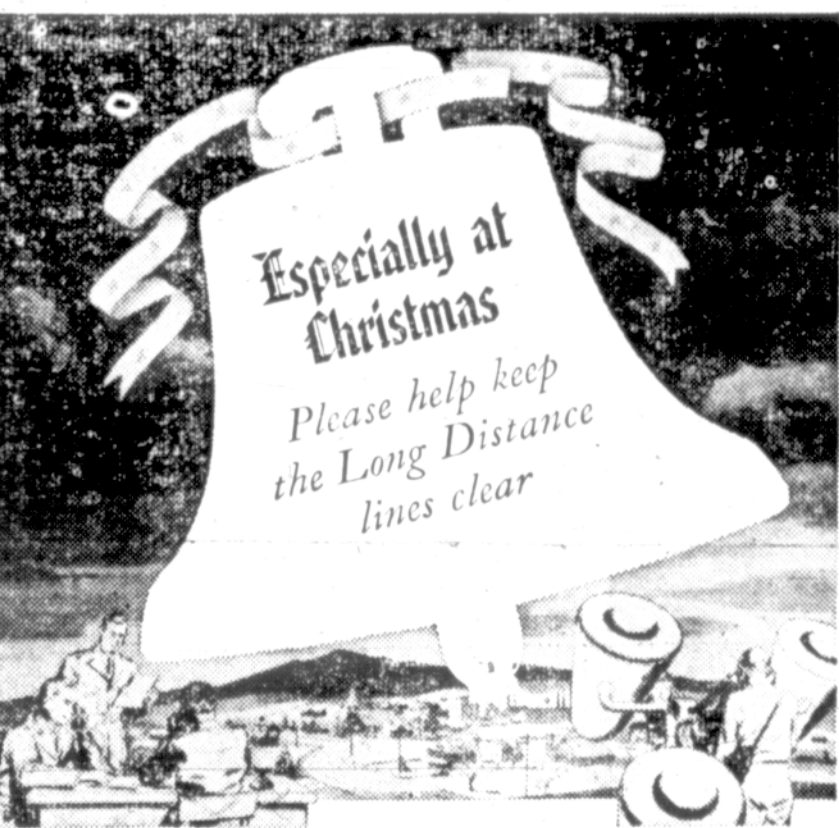
WINTER BREAKFASTS

It is a wise rule to start the day with a good breakfast, especially in winter and in this busy wartime. A good breakfast has appetite appeal, it is nourishing, and it provides needed amounts and proportions of energy foods to carry through until lunchtime.

Leaving out breakfast or eating a hasty, poor one, makes a bad start for any member of the family, young or old. OREGON'S 4-H canning champion for 1942 is Doris Ayers, 18, of Lacombe, Linn county. Chosen by State Club Leader H. C. Seymour for her eight-year record, the girl receives an all-expense trip to the 21st National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, Nov. 29-Dec. 2, provided by the Kerr Glass Corporation, where delegates will discuss further 4-H contributions to the war effort. ... Doris put up 1,520 quarts of fruits, meats, and vegetables, and 61 glasses of jellies. She won many placements on her exhibits, including \$24.15 in cash prizes on her canning products, which brought her total income from all projects to \$1,197.92. The girl was leader of a local canning club this year. ... Doris will compete for Western sectional honors and one of five \$200 college scholarships awarded national winners. This is the fourteenth year of the contest, which is conducted in cooperation with the Extension Service.
