It is reported that J. T. Johnson is recovering satisfactorily from his recent operation at The Dalles Hospital.

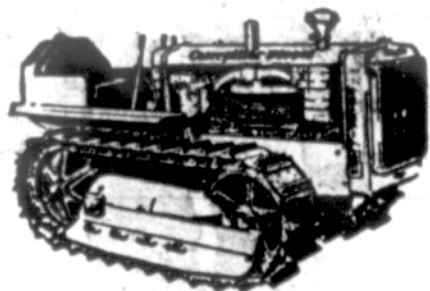
Miss Irma Scott missed two days of school recently from illness.

most two-thirds was stored at Kent station, at which are located the nearest elevators for that area. The farm trucks that carry this grain from the combines in the fields to storage at Kent and Bourbon are so fully utilized in that service that hauling the grain into storage at more remote points like Grass Valley would be out of the question for lack both of sufficient equipment and of required manpower.

Kent Station is 13.84 rail miles south of Grass Valley. The area adjacent to this 13.84 mile segment in the last 5 years produced on the average over 922 tons of grain per mile or slightly more than fifteen 120,000 pound cars.

In the area tributary to Kent station the livestock production of Sherman County is largely concentrated. Although the applicant has built stockyards at Kent station, it has not provided adequate facilities for efficient operation. Improvement in existing facilities would insure fairly regular carload shipments of livestock from Kent Station. This would result from the pooling by several farms of less-than-carload lots into a carload, a practice already followed on the branch at stations where the terminal facilities are adequate.

I do not wish to be understood by anything I have stated or omitted to state herein as implying in any way an acquiescence on the part of the producers and shippers of that portion of Wasco County served by the branch to abandonment of any segment thereof. If they are so advised, undoubtedly they will make an appropriate showing in this connection on their own behalf.

HI-WAYS TO HEALTH

BREAKFAST IS IMPORTANT

Breakfast plays a big part in efficiency. Breakfast's importance in proper nutrition for health is so vital that if you and your family belong to the "not hungry for breakfast" school, it will be worthwhile for you to establish an earlier getting-up time just to develop appetites for this first meal of the day.

Persons who fail to eat breakfast often have poor health records. The long period between tonight's dinner and tomorrow's lunch imposes too great a strain on our systems and their stored nutrients.

A complete breakfast needs milk and fruit, together with substantial grain foods. At least 1/2 of a cup of milk should be included at breakfast. Cereal can be cooked in milk or the milk poured over the cooked cereal.

Many mothers like to serve a hot drink to their children on cold mornings, and have found cocoa made with milk the popular beverage. As there is a scarcity of cocoa and chocolate, it may be necessary to use a substitute flavoring for the milk drink—and it should be remembered that for the best health of the children, the basis of their morning beverage always should be milk. Some children will like just plain hot milk, and if so, there is no substitute problem. If a flavoring is wanted, a little vanilla might be added to the milk, or a sprinkle of cinnamon or nutmeg. Another suggestion is the addition of a little

molasses to the hot milk. For the adult, half hot milk and half coffee is a good choice—an aid to stretching coffee, too.

Along with the breakfast cereals are a variety of breakfast breads everyone enjoys—muffins, biscuits, crusty cornbread, coffee bread. The use of milk in bread is nutritional wisdom, and here is a recipe for muffins whose scrumptious aroma will be sure to bring the members of your family to the breakfast table.

Corn Meal and Bran Muffins

4 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons sugar
2 eggs
2-3 cup bran
2-3 cup milk
2-3 cup corn meal
2-3 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
4 teaspoons baking powder

Cream butter and sugar together. Add eggs one at a time, beating vigorously. Cover bran with milk; let stand several minutes. Add bran, corn meal, flour, salt and baking powder to first mixture. Bake in buttered muffin tins in a hot oven (400 degrees) 20 minutes. Serve hot.
