Here is Your Blank For Ration Book 2. Fill it out. Turn it in.

All persons obtaining War Ration Book Two when registration is held at school houses, must declare the amount of canned and processed foods which are to be rationed which they had on hand on February 21, 1943, and the amount of coffee they had on November 28, 1942, when coffee was rationed.

Dates for registration are as follows:
At Kent, February 22.
At Grass Valley, February 23 and 24.
At Moro, February 25 and 26.
At Rufus, February 27.
At Wasco, March 1 and 2.

As a service to its readers, the Sherman County Journal here-with prints the declaration form. You may clip this, fill it out, and take it to your school when you register. It will be accepted by OPA. Only one form per family is necessary, although books will be issued to all members of the family. It will be necessary also to present the War Ration Book One of each member of the family for inspection when applying for Ration Book Two.

Canned Foods

Include all commercially canned fruits (including spiced); canned vegetables; canned fruit and vegetable juices; canned soups, chili sauce, and catsup.
Do not include canned olives; canned meat and fish; pickles, relish; jellies, jams, and preserves; spaghetti, macaroni, and noodles; or home-canned foods.

3. Number of cans, bottles, and jars (8-ounce size or larger) of commercially packed fruits, vegetables, juices and soups, chili sauce and catsup owned on February 21, 1943, minus 5 for each person included in this Declaration.

SPREAD THE BUTTER

Providing the family with nourishing and appetizing meals that will build strength and morale for the tasks ahead and doing this in the face of food shortages and rationing is the important responsibility of the American homemaker today and no part of the war effort is more important.

While we are promised enough food for everyone, adjustments must be made along the food front in every home. Of greatest concern is the threatening shortage of butter, for good cooks everywhere know there is no real substitute for it—for butter contains the important vitamin A and gives its unique flavor to making other foods more appetizing.

It is because of the important place that butter holds in good nutrition that 30% of the country's butter is going to the armed forces and for lend lease. With butter doing its share in keeping the men in uniform in good physical condition and in helping the people of the allied nations to meet serious food shortages, "spreading the butter" takes on a new wartime meaning.

Homemakers are asking, "Since I have less butter, what's the best way to use the butter I can get?" For those asking this question the following suggestions are offered.

GARDEN SOIL BULLETIN

SERVES AS VICTORY AID

A handbook on garden soils that can serve as a constant reference work for both old and new victory gardeners this year has been issued recently by the O.S.C. extension service in the form of bulletin No. 612, "Garden Soil Management," by A. G. B. Bouquet, professor of vegetable crops.

This is the most complete popular bulletin on this subject yet put out at the college. It discusses all angles of handling garden soils, including preparation, fertilizers, hooster or starting solutions, cultivation, irrigation, mulching, and grouping crops for the best succession of vegetables.

This 24-page bulletin is now available free from any county extension office or direct from the college.

1. Serve butter thriftily. Restaurants and other eating places serving butter now provide one pat only. You can do the same at the family's table.

2. Eat up all you get. If you put butter for seasoning directly on food, none will be left on pan or plate. And it's good wartime manners to leave a clean plate. Taking more butter or any other food than you need, or leaving a little "for manners" is out—for the duration.

3. Make flavor count. That is, use the butter you have where it will taste best. Bread would get priority on the family butter, with many people. A butter-seasoned vegetable would be first with others. It's all a matter of taste.

4. Lose no butter by poor storing. Keep butter tightly covered and in a cold, dark place and protected from strong odors.

5. Avoid butter-rich dishes during the shortage. They are out of step with the times.

6. Butter will spread farther if it is creamed or slightly softened—but not melted. In fixing lunches to carry, creamed butter will spread evenly and to the very edge of the bread for sandwiches.

And remember that stretching this butter supply is a patriotic duty at this time in order that everyone will be able to have his share of this important food.
