BEANS IN WAR TIME MENUS

The point value of dried beans and peas has been cut in half, and many home makers will be using them in place of meat that now requires coupons from their ration book. Beans are good and nourishing food that sticks to the ribs. Among the vegetables, dried beans and peas come nearest to milk and cheese, meat and eggs as body builders. And besides protein they have vitamin B1 and iron, all packed into small space.

Every family has its favorite in the dried bean family and its favorite way of fixing beans. There are many varieties—navy beans—lima beans, kidney beans these and many others. All varieties make good bean soup and good baked beans, make a good filling for sandwiches, and are grand for a hearty salad.

A pound of dried beans for 4 points from your ration book—1 cup is about 3-8 of a pound—that means that for four points you have the makings for a main dish at two meals for a family of six. That's the kind of thoughtful figuring home makers will find well worth while.

To serve in style, add white sauce, catsup and bacon fat to cooked beans and mix together. Sprinkle with grated cheese and bread crumbs and brown in the oven. And here are two recipes that will serve six generously.

Bean Chowder

- 1 cup dry beans
- 1 1-2 qts cold water
- 1 cup diced carrots
- 1 cup tomatoes
- 1 onion, chopped fine
- 2 tsp salt
- 2tbsp uncooked cracked wheat or 1 tbsp flour
- 2 cups milk
- Pepper

Wash the beans; add the cold water and soak overnight. Cook in a covered pan until the beans begin to soften then add the vegetables and continue to cook until tender. Add salt and cracked wheat or flour mixed with a little cold water. Stir. Cook about 30 minutes. Add milk and pepper. Heat to the boiling point and serve. Serves six.

Lima Beans O'Brien

- 2 cups cooked lima beans
 - 1 tbsp scraped onion
 - 1 cup grated cheese
 - 2 hard cooked eggs
 - 1 cup white sauce
 - 1-2 tsp salt, 1-8 tsp pepper
- Mix all ingredients except eggs. Place in buttered baking dish and

bake in a moderate oven (350) for 20 minutes. Garnish with sliced hard cooked eggs.
