Mr. and Mrs. Frank Ward of The Dalles were Monday afternoon visitors at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ormand Hilderbrand.

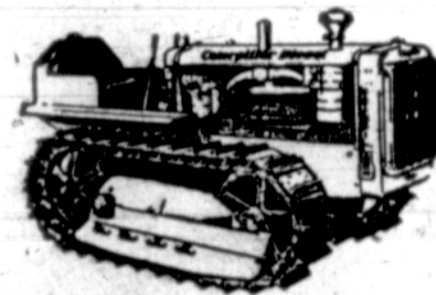
John Hilderbrand celebrated his 16th birthday Sunday, with Eugene Gossen, John Robert McClure and Fred Anderson as his guests.
