Mrs Walter Thornton, sister of Mrs Edith Sayrs, is here this week from Portland for a visit.

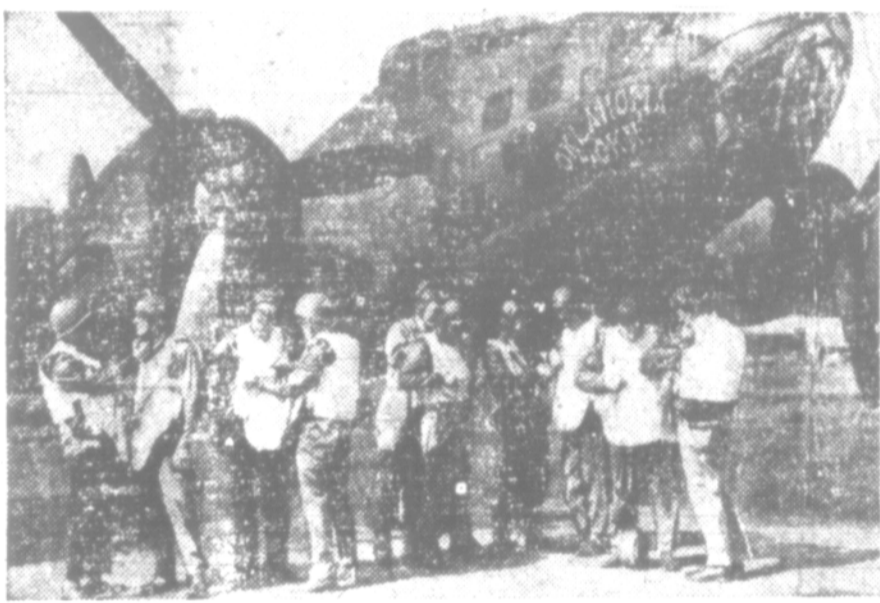

Mr and Mrs Carrell Bennett left Sunday for Marshfield where he will begin work in the branch of the First National Bank after a vacation along the coast of a week or so.

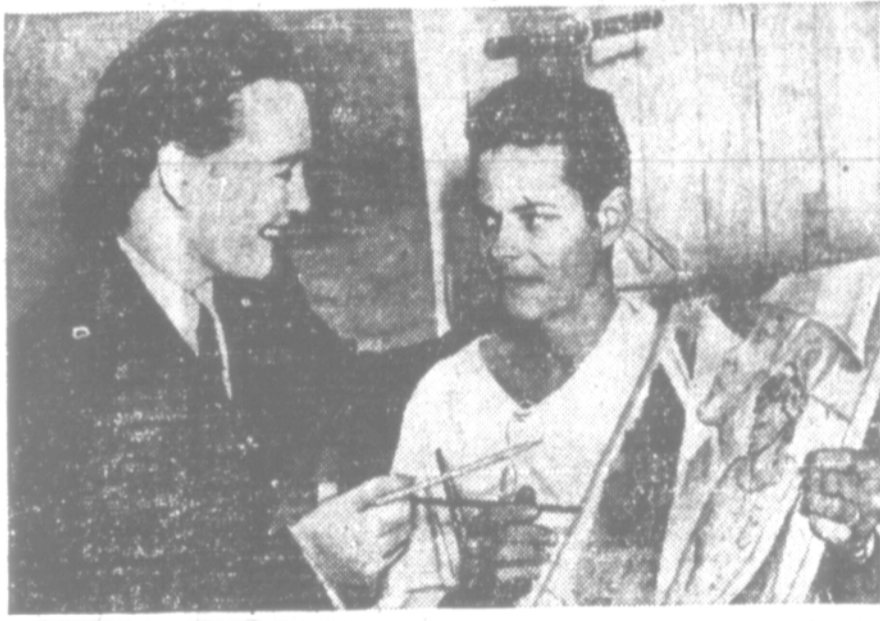
Mr and Mrs A G Futter are here to help start harvesting on their place east of town.
