Harvest Will Take Week or Ten Days Yet

It is estimated by those who should know that harvesting in this county is about three quarters done. Inasmuch as this three quarters has taken in excess of four weeks it is probable that the final quarter will take a week longer which puts the end of the harvest up to the middle of September, one of the latest dates for the end of harvest in recent times.

Rain has delayed harvest, wet mornings have been a bother, the crop was too big to fit the storage with resultant delays, there is a shortage of men and a shortage of machines. All these have held up the harvest.

FRUIT WASTE DECRIED

Because he sees a number of apparently abandoned orchards as his business takes him through the countryside, Hugh Taylor of the state department of agriculture division of plant industry is urged that owners of these make a special effort to see that the fruit gets to persons who do not have trees at home.

In fact, he even goes further and suggests that townsfolk with victory gardens who have a surplus of vegetables make it a point to divide with neighbors.

As a war measure, he believes that it is vital that all fruit and garden produce that possibly can be saved be utilized this year. He suggests that non-commercial orchard owners put up a sign advising that they will give fruit away for the picking or will sell it cheaply as a means of aiding the war effort.

NEW B & C CARDS NEEDED

Car owners who still hold the old type B and C gasoline ration coupon books should exchange them for the new mileage ration sheets of coupons between August 23 and September 1, OPA announced recently. Old type B and C coupons become invalid September 1, and gasoline dealers cannot accept them on and after that date. The old type coupons are identified by the words "Permits delivery of one unit of gasoline." The new type say "Mileage Ration" plus a large B or C.

FEWER CARS THIS YEAR

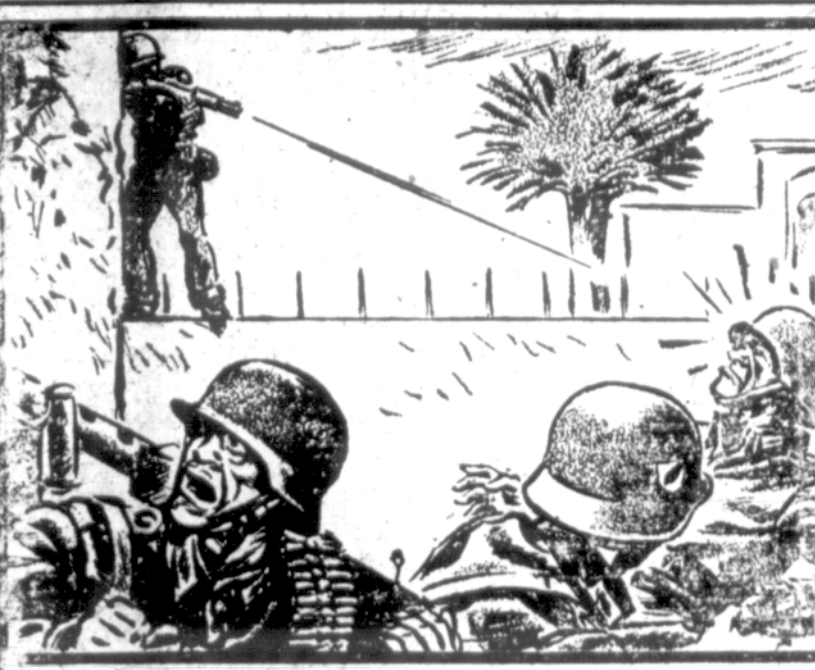
Motor vehicle registrations in Oregon at the end of July totaled 401,795, Bob Farrell, secretary of state announced today. This compares to a registration of 408,437 vehicles a year ago, a decrease of a little over one percent.

There were 323,673 private passenger cars registered in the state, 1,080 busses, 32,989 light trucks and 41,038 heavy trucks.

Registration fees total \$3,247,888.24, compared to \$3,209,044.54. The increase is due to increased numbers of trucks and busses registered in the state. Truck registrations are up three percent and bus registrations show an increase of 42 percent.

POINTS CAN BE HAD

Individuals who require special ration point allotments, such as persons in isolated areas who must buy large quantities of rationed foods at a time, are to be provided with a new type of red and blue food ration coupons, according to OPA. They will be used the same way as stamps, but will be good at any time. Ration coupons may be issued by local Boards and OPA offices.
