RATION REMINDER

RATION BOOK NO. 2

October 2.—Expiration date of red stamps X, Y, and Z. last of red stamps series in War Ration Book 2. X became valid August 22; Y on August 29, and Z on September 5.

September 20.—Expiration date of blue stamps R, S, and T (processed foods). Blue stamps U, V, and W, valid September 1, through October 20.

RATION BOOK NO. 3 (Brown stamps) Replacement book containing coupons to be used for purchase of meats, fats, butter, cheese, oils.

October 2.—Expiration date of brown stamps A and B. A becomes valid September 12; B on September 19. October 30.—Expiration date of brown stamps C, D, E and F. C becomes valid September 23; D on October 3; E on October 10; and F on October 17. Each weekly series good for 16 points.

RATION BOOK NO. 1 Sugar. October 31.—Expiration date for stamp No. 14, five pounds, and for canning sugar stamps No. 15 and 16, each good for 5 pounds.

Shoes. October 31.—Expiration date of stamp No. 18 for one pair of shoes.

STOVES

August 24.—Rationing of cooking and heating stoves began. Includes most new stoves burning coal, wood, oil or gas for domestic use. Purchasers must get certificates from ration boards.

FUEL OIL

September 30.—Period 1 coupons in new fuel oil rations valid through January 3, 1944. One unit, period five coupons, valid through September 30 for 10 gallons. Ten units, period 5 coupons, valid thru September 30 for 100 gallons. Coupons with gallonage printed on the face valid for amount indicated until expiration date shown on coupon sheet.

TIRES

Cars with C ration books must have tires inspected every 3 months; B books every 4 months; A books every 6 months. September 30 next inspection deadline for A book holders. Commercial motor vehicles—tire inspection every 6 months or every 5,000 miles, whichever occurs first.

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HI-WAYS TO HEALTH by ADA R. MAYNE OREGON DAIRY COUNCIL

All parents want their children quart in cooked foods - is the first essential in the diet of children. When desirable amounts of fruits and vegetables (some served raw) eggs, meat, whole-grain cereals, and a dependable source of vitamin D are also included, the child's food needs are likely to be met. Desserts are valuable for the food energy, flavor and interest which they add to the meal. Here is a pudding recipe that is a favorite with children.

PRUNE CREAM PUDDING
1-2 cup sugar 1 tbl molasses
3 tbl flour 1 tbl butter
1-2 tsp salt 1-3 cup chopped

Every child is entitled to three well balanced meals each day. Although rationing has forced changes in your meal patterns, it is still necessary and possible to plan according to the best standards for health and growth.

In these busier than ever days it would seem there is little time for meal planning. Actually more time is needed. Exchanging one food for another and overcoming prejudices of children and grown-ups too means the homemaker has a bigger job than ever before.

A food guide is important. Be adaptable, making use of all of its possibilities. Here is a guide for meals suitable for families with young children.

BREAKFAST

Fruit, whole-grain cereal, egg, buttered toast, milk or cocoa made with milk.

LUNCH

Nourishing main dish such as Macaroni and cheese, vegetable or fruit, whole-grain bread and butter, milk.

DINNER

Meat or meat substitute, potatoes, vegetables, bread and butter, dessert if desired, milk.

Milk—one cup to drink at each meal and the remainder of the

2 cups milk cooked prunes
Heat milk in double boiler. Mix sugar, flour and salt. Slowly add milk, molasses and butter, stirring. Return to double boiler and cook and stir until thickened. Continue cooking for 15 minutes. Add prunes and turn into dish to cool. Serves 6.

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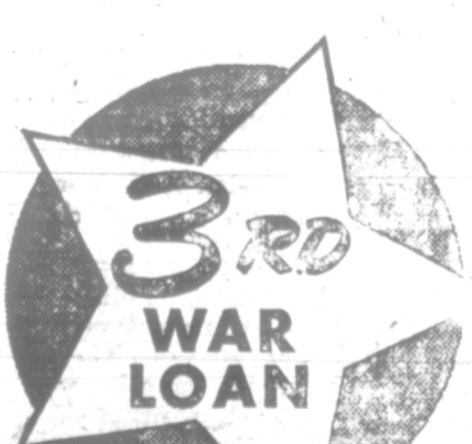
