RAILROADS CROWDED

A warning to livestock shippers that advance notice on the needs for cattle cars will be necessary this fall has been issued by the OSC extension service at the suggestion of national agricultural officials. Both transportation and processing facilities are expected to be strained to the limit this fall to care for the heavy run of cattle and hogs moving to market.

In former years it has been customary for shippers to deliver livestock to loading pens without advance notice to the railroads regarding car requirements. Such procedure cannot be followed this year if the railroads are to provide the services expected of them, according to information received by the extension service.

During the coming rush months all shippers are asked to place orders for cars with railroad agents in advance of the time they expect to load their livestock.
