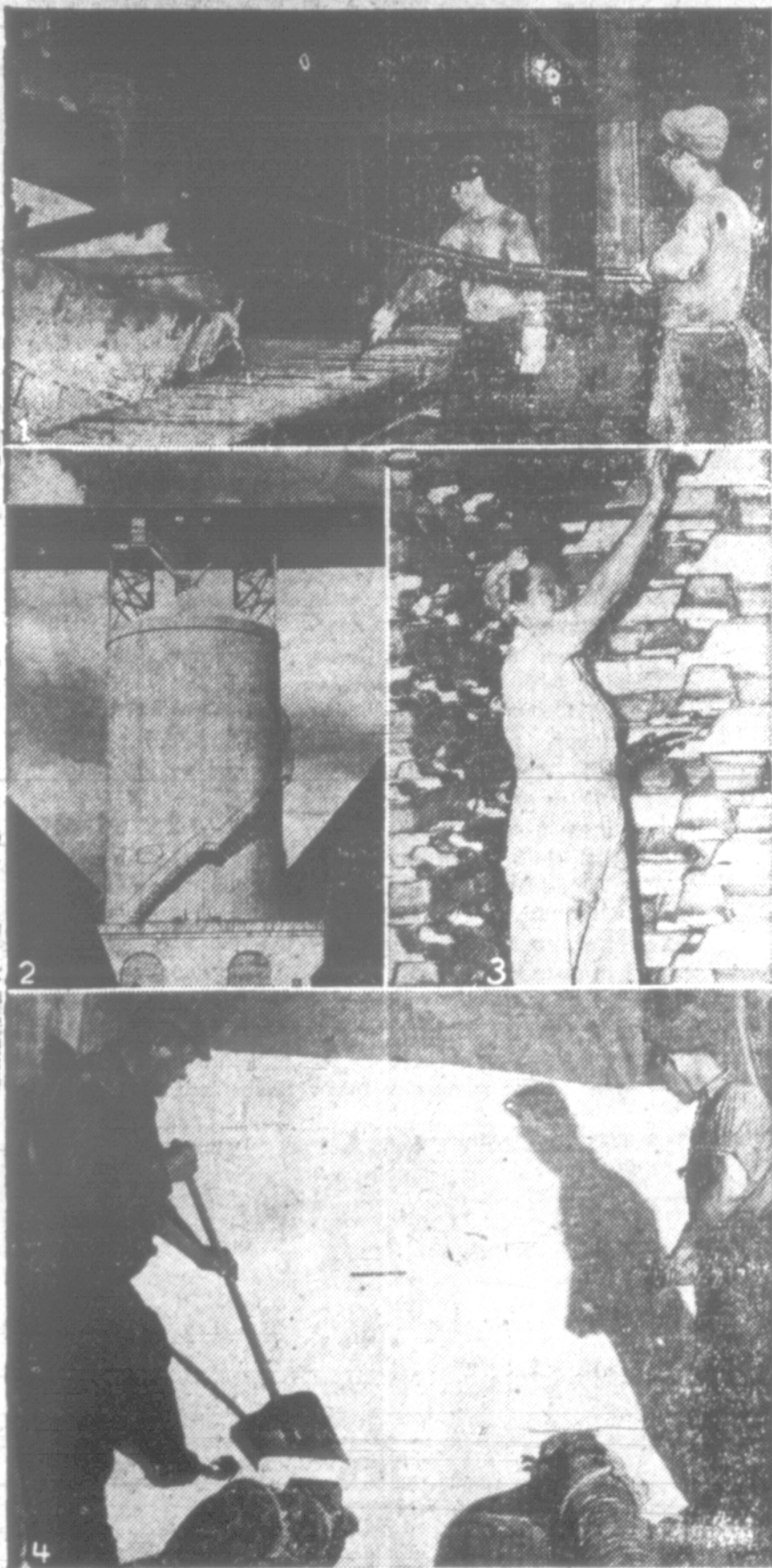
Mr and Mrs Art Bibby and children were business visitors at Tygh Valley Sunday.
