HI-WAYS TO HEALTH by ADA R. MAYNE OREGON DAIRY COUNCIL

The woman who does not want to gain weight need not judge arithmetic sums to balance calories. Chances are she's getting less sugar and fats in her meals than she had in peacetime, and using more of her energy on extra wartime jobs. Spot welder or homemaker, if she's physically active she needs a good deal of energy food. And that's likely true for the whole family including the children who always require plenty of body fuel.

True, years back, nutritionists were alarmed at the diets heavily loaded with bread and other "starchy" foods and not balanced with enough of the protective foods. But times have changed. Today, flours and cereals are enriched to put back many of the values once lost in milling.

About one-fourth more grain foods with more milk, fruits and vegetables can well be used in American war-time meals to offset reduced quantities of meats, fats and sweets. When eating more cereal foods, be sure to include more of the protective foods

to add vitamins and minerals lacking in cereals. Here is a substantial vegetable dish that can double for a main course—one that combines vegetables and milk to good advantage.

PLANTATION PIE

- 1 1-2 cups cooked Limas or peas
- 1 cup cooked wax beans
- 1 1-2 cup sliced cooked carrots
- 1 tsp. grated onion
- 1-2 tsp. paprika
- 1-2 tsp. celery salt
- 3 cups medium white sauce
- Corn bread top
- Combine vegetables and seasonings with white sauce, pour into well-buttered 1-1-2 quart casserole and cover with Corn Bread. Top. Serves 6.

CORN BREAD TOP

- 1 1-4 cups flour
- 3-4 tsp salt
- 3-4 cup corn meal
- 1 egg
- 2 tsp sugar
- 1-2 cup milk
- 4 tsp baking pwd
- 2 tsp butter
- Sift flour, measure; add corn meal, sugar, baking powder and salt; sift again. Beat egg, add milk and butter; mix well. Stir liquid into dry ingredients; blend.

ing only enough to moisten; spread thinly on warm pie mixture. Place in moderate oven (375 degrees) for 45 minutes or until baked. (Partly cooked and thoroughly drained sausages can be arranged on top before putting in oven.)
