All of the men who were examined for army duty three weeks ago, will report next Monday and will leave here Sunday, except Bob King who has until later in the week to report.

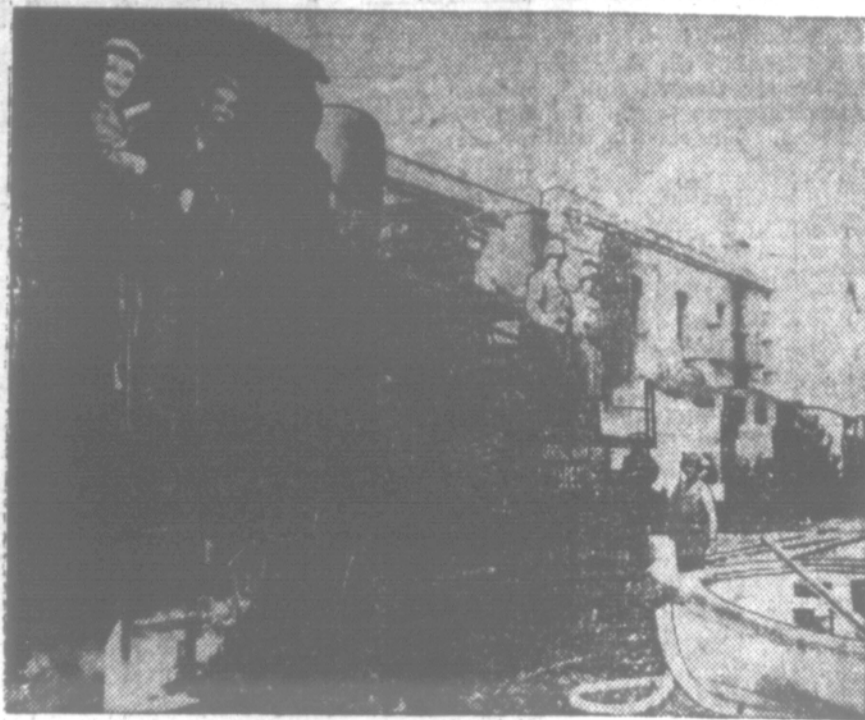

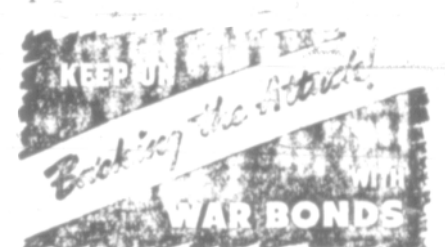

Navy Wants Ship Repair Men

Response to the Navy's call for skilled tradesmen for the new S.R.U. ship repair unit has been excellent in this area, reports E. A. Lang, in charge of the Dalles naval recruiting station, but a number of misunderstandings have been revealed in interviews conducted at the office in recent weeks.

Perhaps the most common mistake thus far is that many men have applied for ratings in the S.R.U. after they have received notice of induction from their selective service boards. Recruiter Lang emphasizes the fact that applications must be made before these notices have been received.

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The Navy cannot enlist a man for the ship repair unit if he has been ordered for induction.

Another common error is that many persons in class 1B and 2B have applied for S.R.U. ratings. No man in either of those classifications can be enlisted, the recruiter declares, and it is only a waste of time for him to come in for an interview unless he has been cleared by the war manpower commission.

Men between the ages of 38 and 50 1-2, inclusive, do not have to be cleared, however. They may be accepted at the station and sent to the main station at Portland for final enlistment.
