Mrs. Orville Yocum entertained her sister, Mrs. Bert Lund and daughter, Susan of Bremerton on Thanksgiving.

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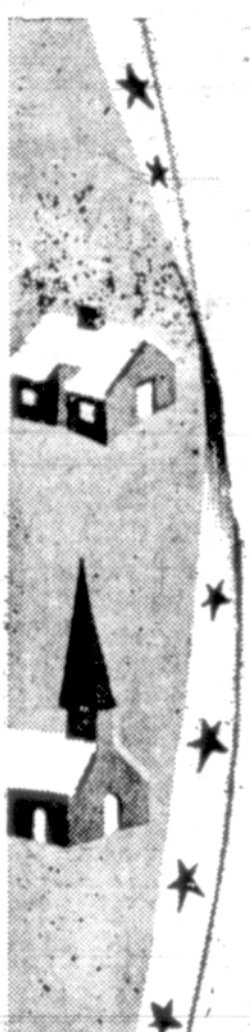
