The state as a whole sold \$237,622 in bonds to give it a percentage of 105 which included army and navy sales. Only 11 counties to reach their quota November were Harney with 111 and Multnomah with 105. Low were Curry with 41. Malheur with 39 percent of quota.

The December quota for Sherman county remains at \$11,000.

The county equipment has been working at the railroad crossing on First street this week clearing the ground for an extension of the switch nearest the elevator. When built it will permit the grain growers to shift cars across the street and load more cars between trains.
