

Early Day Dentist Dies In Salem; Had Long Practice

Dr. Lloyd D. Idleman, 64, died in Salem after an illness that had caused an operation earlier in the year. Forty years ago Dr. Idleman was a dentist in Moro with offices in the now removed Maxwell building. He had learned his profession early and practiced it for 45 years. For 22 years he had been dentist at Fairview home near Salem. Funeral services were held in Salem Saturday and last rites at the Portland crematorium. He is survived by his widow, formerly Day Anderson and one daughter of Seaside.

I'm telling you this to show you how seriously we used to take our base ball up in Sherman county.
