BRUSSELS SPROUTS POPULAR

Victory gardeners who raised a few plants of Brussels sprouts this year are finding now that these are among the hardiest of vegetables and will stand lower temperatures than almost any other member of the cabbage family. They thus provide a continuing outdoor source under Oregon conditions of a vegetable moderately high in vitamins A, B and C, as well as iron.

Brussels sprouts are becoming more important in Oregon and other northwest states as a vegetable for the frozen food trade, reports A. G. B. Bouquet, professor of vegetable crops at O.S.C., in a circular of information on production methods. Starting in 1937 with a frozen pack in Oregon and Washington of 183,780 pounds the output in 1942 reached 1,867,627 pounds, or about half the national total.
