## 1944 WAR FUND

This year, with service flags in windows of nearly every home, Red Cross will mean so much more to Americans. As depicted in this reproduction of a 1944 Red Cross War Fund poster, many windows also will display the symbol of participation in the cause of Mercy and Humanity—the Red Cross.



Patriotic men and women all over the country are joining the ever-growing ranks of blood-donor, giving a pint of blood to the Red Cross to help insure the safety of our armed forces. Great care is taken to see that no one gives blood unless he is physically able to do so, and the well-being of a healthy person is not endangered by this loss. Usually they are physically fit to make another donation at the end of three or four months. Nevertheless each donor should take special care, in the weeks immediately following a donation, to see that his meals include foods that furnish iron and protein. These are the chief dietary factors in the blood which has been lost and they must be adequately supplied by the daily meals if blood regeneration is to take place as rapidly as possible.

No food is more important in this process than liver, and the oft suggested rule of serving liver once a week should be followed and could be increased to even twice a week.

Meat, eggs, and dried beans and peas are good sources of both iron and protein, and should be given prominence in the daily meals. Under rationing, it may not be possible to have a serving of meat every day, but eggs and dried beans are plentiful and may be used in larger amounts on the days meat is not served.

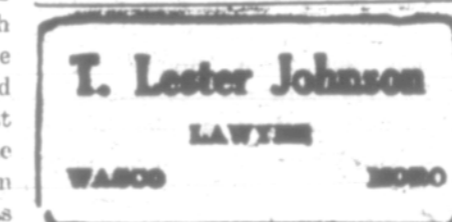
Dark green leafy vegetables are very good sources of iron - and be sure to use the liquid in which they are cooked. Whole grain cereals and breads, and dried fruits are other good sources of iron.

The "pint of milk a day" recommended for all adults provides a large share of the needed protein, and the calcium it contains helps the body make better use of iron supplied by the foods you eat.

These suggestions, placing special emphasis on the foods that supply iron and protein, should not in any way lessen the emphasis on other foods that are necessary in a well-rounded diet, for it is only when all factors are provided adequately that health and vitality are attained.

## GAS COUPON CHECK

Beginning the week of March 6, OPA will attempt to check all gasoline ration books to see that the coupons are properly endorsed with license number and state, as part of the nationwide campaign against black markets in gasoline. Motorists found with unendorsed coupons will be notified to report to their local board within 10 days with endorsed books. Anyone who fails to do this faces revocation of ratings.

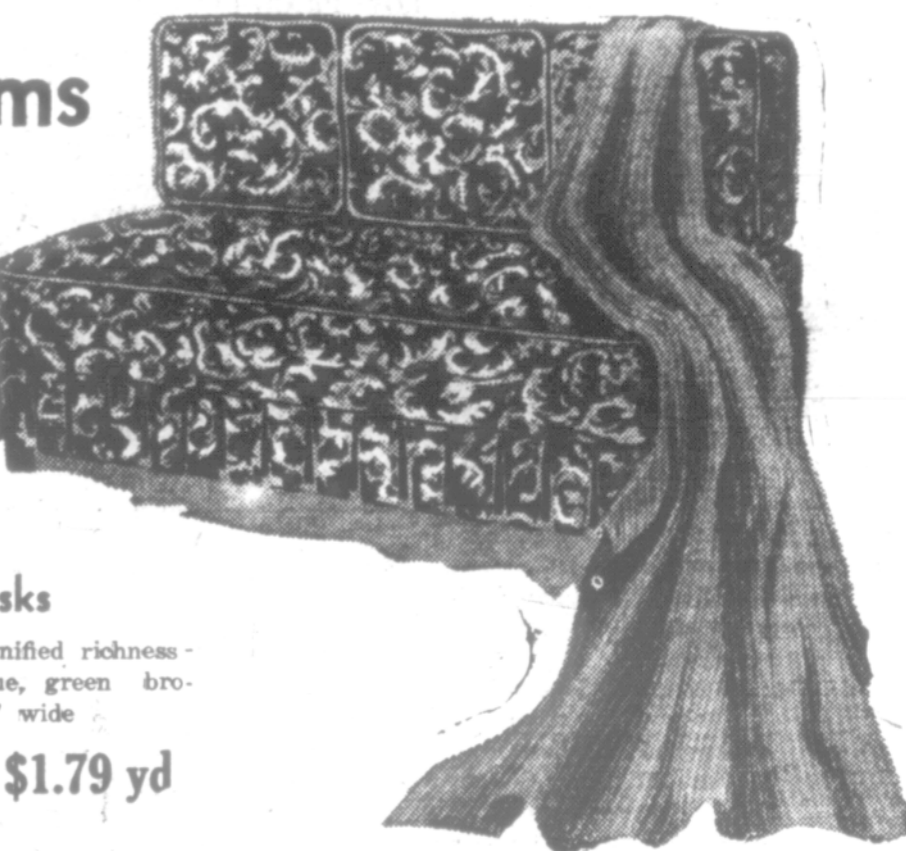
