Mrs. America will be carrying only one food ration book with her when she goes to market after March 20th. For on that date, brown stamps Y and Z in Was-

co will expire. Book Four contains red stamps for meats, and the blue stamps for processed foods. Each of these now has a point value of ten regardless of the printed numbers. Book Four also contains green stamps K, L, and M, currently valid for processed foods. Since

the green stamps expire on March 20th, these should be used before starting on the blue stamps. Sugar stamp No. 30, which is good indefinitely, also is in Book Four.

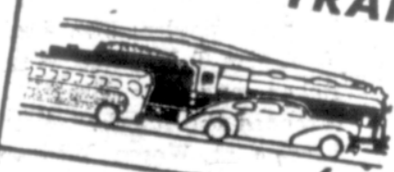
