Voters Warned to Register

By, on or before April 18, 1944

REGISTRATION BOOKS CLOSE AT 8:00 P. M. TUESDAY, APRIL 18th AND REMAIN CLOSED UNTIL AFTER MAY 19th.

Registration books are now open for registering and will so remain open until 8:00 p.m. of the first above stated date.

If you have been a resident of Oregon during the last six months, 21 years of age and are otherwise qualified you may register and vote.

If you become 21 years of age during the time the registration books are closed, and prior to election, and are otherwise qualified you may register and vote.

If you have in past years been registered and did not vote during the 1942 Primary or 1942 General election your registration has automatically been cancelled unless you have made a special written request of the County Clerk that your registration be kept in force and effect.

If you have changed your residence from one voting precinct into another precinct you should cancel your registration and re-register in the precinct which you have adopted as your home.

If you have changed your name by marriage, or otherwise, you should cancel your registration and re-register in your newly acquired name.

Anyone qualified to register in his respective voting precinct may either register at the office of the County Clerk or with the registrar of his voting precinct.

When hot milk is added to egg the sugar should be mixed with the egg, not with the milk. Then the milk should be added to the egg a little at a time.

Here is a recipe for a delicate unsweetened custard to serve hot with cooked spring greens or other cooked vegetables, or cold on a green salad platter.

EGG CUSTARD
2 to 4 eggs, beaten
1 - 2 cups milk
1 - 2 cups meat broth
Salt and pepper

Heat the liquid. Gradually add the liquid to beaten eggs, season with salt and pepper, and pour into custard cups. Set in pan of hot water and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) 25 to 30 minutes or until custard is set. Serve hot or cold.

In custards and other egg and milk combinations, curdling is often a problem. This may be prevented by proper mixing and by cooking at moderate heat, until the mixture is firm, but no longer.

USE OF EGGS URGED THIS MONTH

Western consumers will find a super abundance of farm fresh eggs on the market during the next month or so, reports Lewis A. Nichols of WFA, Office of Distribution, Pendleton.

The abundance is so extreme that warehouse space is already taxed to capacity. Even though this temporary surplus exists at present we need continued heavy production to meet our home front and war needs. Nichols points out that consumers can help the marketing situation during this period of over supply by eating or preserving an extra dozen eggs

piece. In addition the home maker who uses as many eggs as possible while supplies are plentiful is helping to take the pressure of less abundant rationed foods, Nichols indicates.

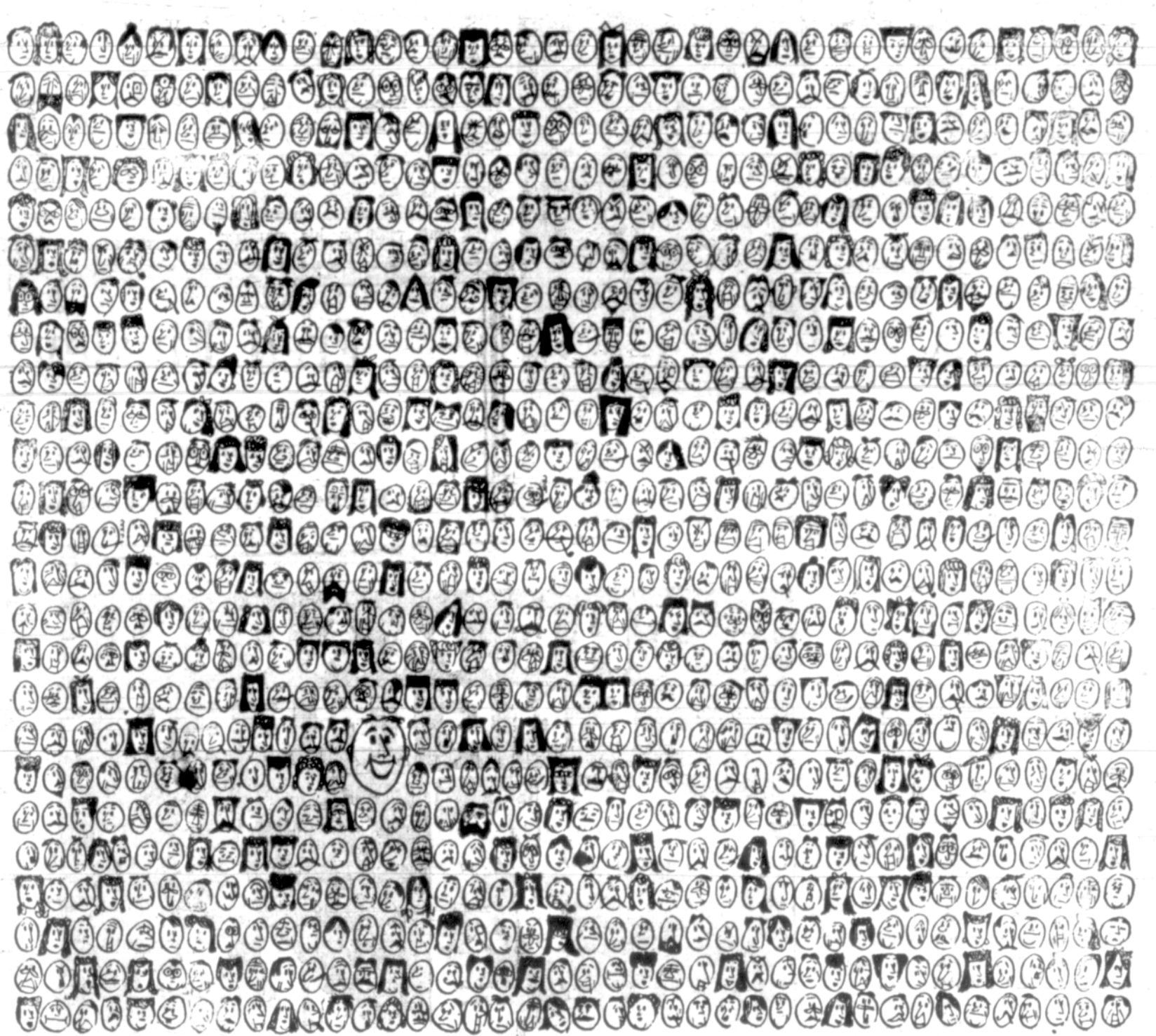

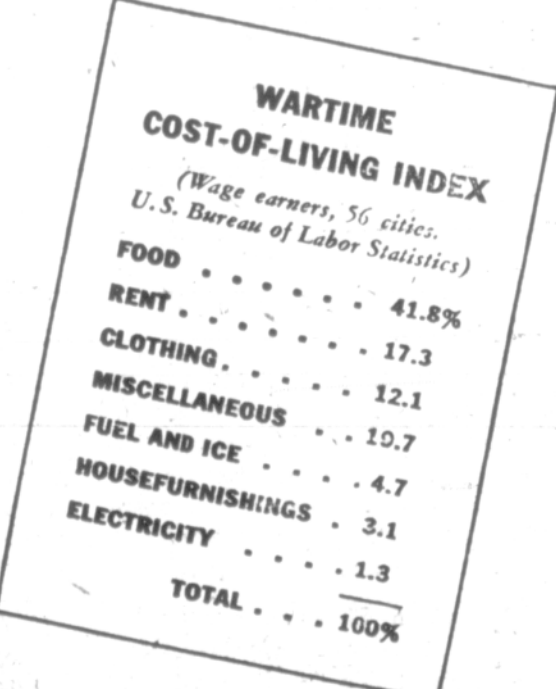
