On the Democratic side there are 11 candidates for delegate to the national convention and six are to be chosen. Only two are in the race as delegates from this district, insuring election.

C J Shorb is unopposed for the nomination for congress on the Democratic side and William Lam-

bert has no opposition for state treasurer nomination, nor has Bruce Spalding for attorney general. There are no candidates on the Democratic ticket for the state senate or the house of representatives.

The county Democratic ticket is fairly well filled with T Lester Johnson running for district attorney, Charles Ruggles for assessor, Ross Ornduff for clerk and Charles Wilson for sheriff.

Sample ballots may be obtained from election boards this week and decisions made on voting for the nominations that have not attracted attention heretofore.
