MORE TIRES MADE

The Rubber Director's office has authorized OPA to release 1,600,000 passenger car tires during the month of June, 1944 for essential civilian driving. This is approximately 200,000 more tires than were finally authorized for release in May. New regulations governing tires for special vehicles such as tractors and road-graders, and not to civilian passenger car tires were promulgated last week. Output of synthetic rubber in the month of May came to the record figure of nearly 70,000 tons, Rubber Director Bradley Dewey announced.
