### PLENTY PROTEIN FOUND IN HAM & EGGS

Oregon homemakers need fear no "high protein shortage" for their tables, such as has been bothering stockmen in recent years points out Miss Lucy Case, extension nutritionist at OSC. The abundance of an old American favorite combination, bacon and eggs, will supply high protein food that is ration-free and quickly prepared, she says.

A man-sized serving of two fried eggs with three rashers of bacon will supply more than 16 grams of protein, totaling about one-fourth of the adult daily need. One need not feel guilty of living sumptuously on these foods as the government is now appealing for more use of eggs, while logs have been slaughtered in record numbers the past year.

Ways suggested by Miss Case for serving these hot include scrambled eggs with diced bacon, shirred or baked eggs circled with bacon, omelets speckled with bacon, souffles with diced cooked bacon, and escalloped dishes of left-over vegetables rejuvenated with bacon and sliced hard-cooked eggs.

French toast fried in bacon grease and served with bacon is a pleasing variation, she says.

tant procedure has been worked out that provides for orderly and fair distribution of such government material, says Taylor.

Chief change from former times requires that these trucks be handled through regular licensed vehicle dealers, where they will be subject to price regulations, thus assuring final sale to users at fair prices and without undue profit to handlers. ### PLENTIFUL FOODS

Foods that will be plentiful in most of the country during July include:—Eggs; frozen vegetables, canned green and wax beans; dry mix and dehydrated soups; peanut butter; citrus marmalade; soy flour, grits and flakes; wheat flour and bread; macaroni, spaghetti, noodles; oatmeal and rye breakfast foods, WFA says. Fresh apricots will be plentiful in the Pacific coast area and fresh snap beans in Eastern U.S. Fresh peaches are expected to be plentiful in July and August.

Retail prices on new low cost clothing items that meet specifications of WPB, as announced by the OPA, will be: Cotton house dresses, \$1.49; women's cotton slips, 66c; men's printed, solid color and white shirts, \$1.39; and men's shorts, 39c. WPB is allocating the fabrics for clothing items to be produced and distributed during July, August and September.

Severe civilian shortages now exist in washbasins, alarm clocks, window screening and flashlights,

WPB reports, with less severe shortages in flashlight batteries, clothes pins, double boilers, egg beaters, pails, radio tubes, and umbrellas, mops, rope, bedsprings and bobble pins.
