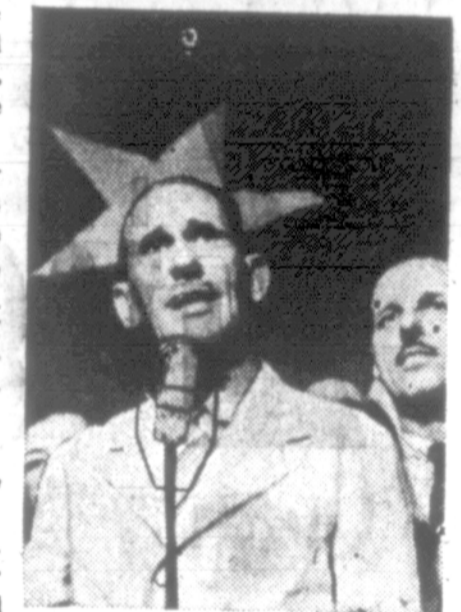

Mr and Mrs Frank Reid and son of Portland were guests of his parents, Mr and Mrs David Reid, several days.

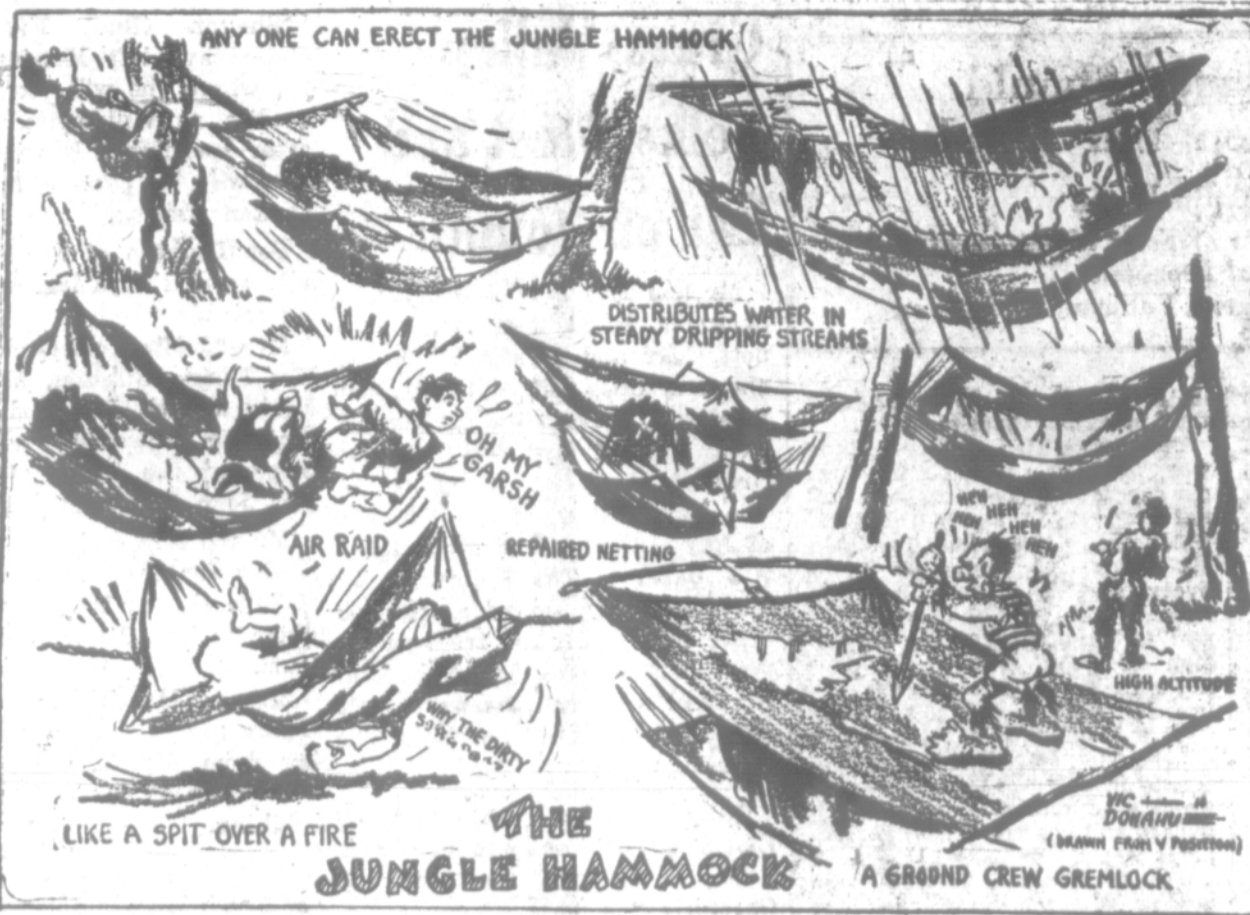

### TIRES STILL SHORT EASIER TO GET

Although quotas of new passenger car tires available for rationing show an increase for June, the demand still far exceeds the supply. So lady, take heed whether you drive the family auto or just keep a watchful eye on it. Get every bit of wear from tires before going to the OPA board for a replacement certificate. "B" and "C" bookholders, of course, are eligible to apply for new passenger tires but local boards, still give first attention to the most essential motorists. And "A" bookholders are eligible for ration certificates for Grade three tires—recapped, used or second—if any are available in the community. But OPA boards will not authorize any type of replacement as long as a tire can be recapped or repaired successfully. And incidentally, Grade A camel back now can be obtained for passenger cars.

Ice cream has both qualifications of a good food—appetite appeal and food value. It is an energy food with added minerals, vitamins, and quality protein. So in planning meals, remember that ice cream may be considered a dividend in the day's supply of milk.

**RASPBERRY SAUCE**  
1-2 cup sugar 2 tbsp lemon juice  
1 tbsp cornstarch 3 tbsp water  
2 cups raspberries  
Mix the sugar and cornstarch and combine with the berries, lemon juice and cold water. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until berries are very tender. Rub mixture through sieve. Serve while still warm over vanilla ice cream. Makes 1-2 cups of sauce.

**CARMEL SAUCE**  
1 cup sugar 1 tbsp cornstarch  
1 1/2 cups boiling water 1 tsp salt  
2 tbsp butter 1-2 cup cold water  
1 tsp vanilla  
Melt sugar in heavy skillet over low heat until a light-amber color, stirring constantly. Pour in the boiling water and continue heating, stirring constantly, until sugar is all dissolved. Add the butter and mix to a smooth paste. Add the cornstarch, salt and the cold water. Stir until blended and simmer for 20 minutes, stirring often. Cool. Add the vanilla. Makes about 2 cups of sauce.

Ice cream is not as plentiful as today for civilians as it was before the war because we are sharing with the armed forces. Even so there will be more commercial ice cream during the summer months, at least—although the supply may not be large enough to satisfy everyone's craving for ice cream. In other words, it is much a first come first served idea just now. Servings of ice cream or sherbet look larger when served with fruit or sauces—on cake or cookies. There are literally dozens of sauces to choose, from the year-
