Mr and Mrs Ralph Rust of Grass Valley were Sunday guests of Mr and Mrs Vivian Rust.

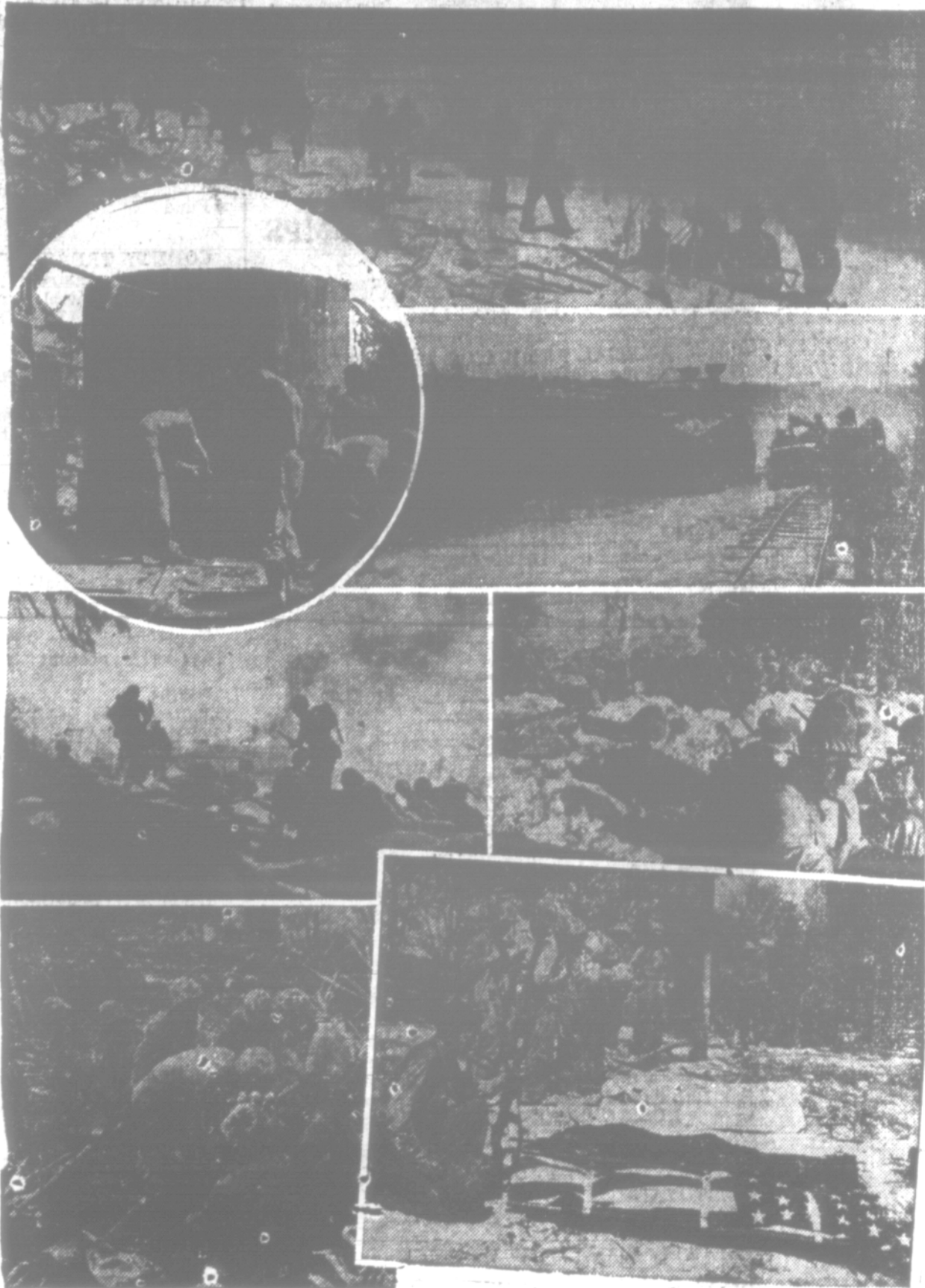

Marines spearheaded the attack on heavily fortified Saipan and suffered the major share of casualties. Typical scenes, recorded by Marine combat photographers during the first few days of landing, show the beachhead; Leathernecks washing at a captured reservoir; a gutted American tank; digging in for stands on the beach; and farther inland a mortar crew in action—and last, a final farewell to fallen comrades. Saipan, like Tarawa, exacted a heavy toll on the Marine assault forces, who after the initial landing never took a backward step.

CENSORSHIP RULES

Byron Price, director of the Office of Censorship, in his semi-annual review of censorship regulations has this to say: "The successes of the Allied forces around the world do not diminish the need for voluntary censorship. On the contrary, it is more important than ever that the codes be observed in spirit and in detail. With respect to the Pacific-Asiatic area, editors and broadcasters have an inescapable responsibility. The enemy knows it is our intention to liberate the Philippines and all of the other territory now under Japanese occupation; and to carry the attack also to the mainland of Japan by land, sea and air. What we must protect at all hazards, is information of the time, place and method of attack, the sequence of operations, the strength of the attacking forces and their technical make-up and equipment."
