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MILITARY HAS SEVERE SHORTAGES

"Production has dropped off slightly in the face of increased demands," from overseas, Gen. Brehon B. Somervell, of the Army Service Forces, said in citing some specific shortages suffered in various military theatres of war. Some examples cited were: One general had to call off 100 air missions because of lack of the right type of bombs; another general said he had to abandon 3,500 heavy trucks, which have to be replaced; rate of fire or artillery has more than doubled above estimates, thus increasing demands on new guns, replacement linings and ammunition. Heavy artillery rather than air power broke deadlocks at Anzio, Cassino and in Normandy, General Somervell said.
