COUNTERFEITERS FOILED

Counterfeiters are going to have a tough job duplicating the new "A" basic gasoline ration coupons that motorists will soon receive from their local boards. Roth Keller, acting mileage enforcement representative, emphasized today. The "A" 13 coupons are printed on a new type of yellow government safety paper and every coupon bears a serial number, he revealed. In addition the same serial number appears on the cover of the book and a record of it is made by the issuing board. New "A" books come into use

at 12.01 a. m. September 22 when the current "A-12's" the last coupons in the old book, expire.

Regardless of the new safety features, the "A-13's" must be properly endorsed as soon as they are received. Keller declared, as the endorsement makes it possible to trace an illegal coupon to the person who put it in circulation.

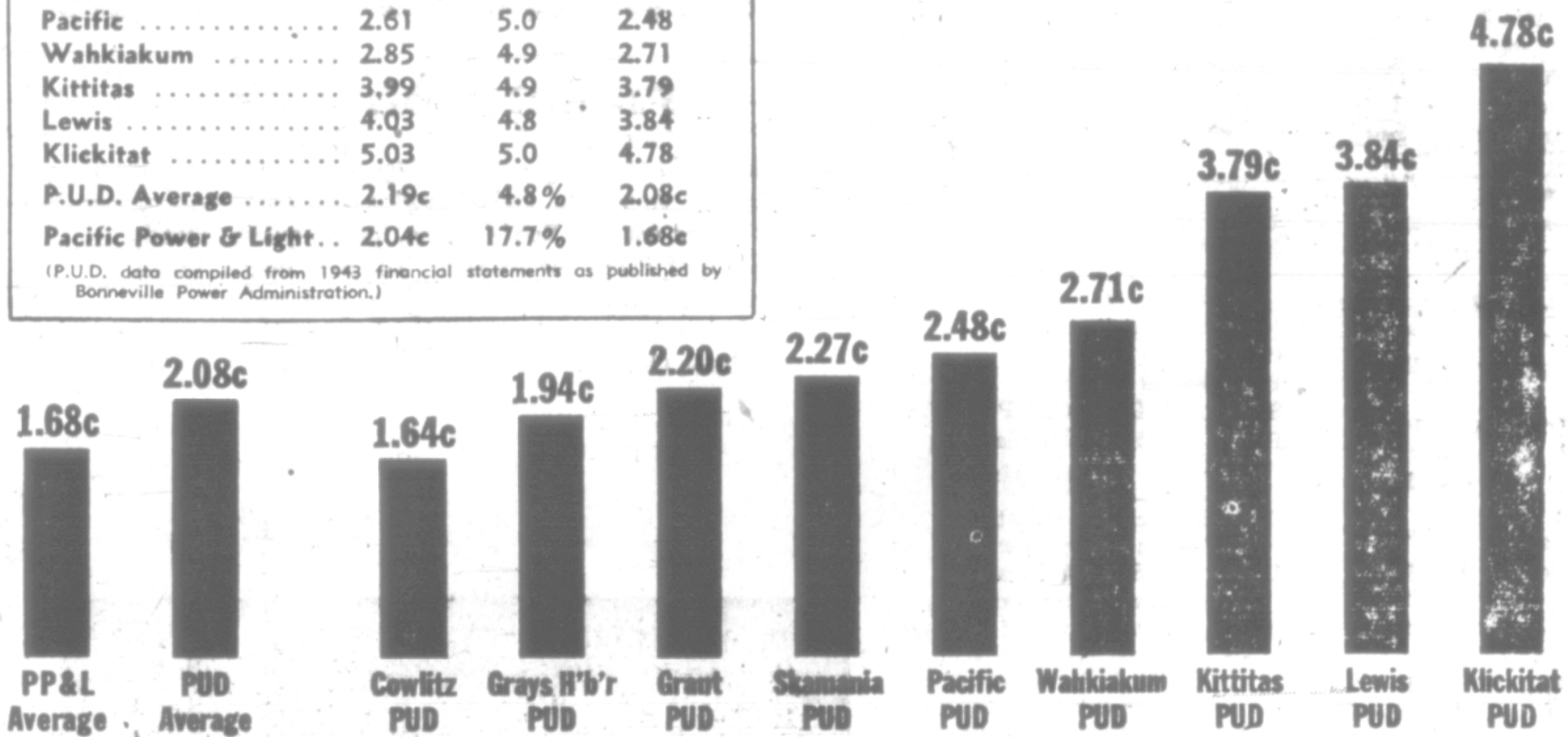

If the promoters can put this scheme over on the electricity users and taxpayers of Washington, they plan to move into Oregon next! So look again at the chart above.
