IF YOU ARE NOT REGISTERED YOU ARE NOT ELIGIBLE TO VOTE

REGISTRATION BOOKS ARE NOW OPEN FOR REGISTERING AND WILL REMAIN OPEN UNTIL 8:00 P. M. OCTOBER 7th, 1944.

If you have in past years been registered and did not vote during the 1942 Primary Election or in 1942 General Election, your registration has automatically been cancelled, unless you have made a special written request of the County Clerk that your registration be kept in force and effect. (Such request must be in writing and signed by the registrant)

If you have been a resident of Oregon for the last six months, 21 years of age and are otherwise qualified, you may register and vote.

If you have changed your residence from the precinct in which you are registered to another precinct within the county or state you should cancel your registration and re-register in the precinct in which you have established your new home.

If you have changed your name by marriage or otherwise, you should cancel your registration and re-register your newly acquired name.

Anyone qualified to register in his respective precinct may either register at the office of the County Clerk or at any one of the following named registrars:

The County Clerk's office will be open on October 7th from 8:00 A. M. until 8:00 P. M. for the purpose of receiving registrations.
