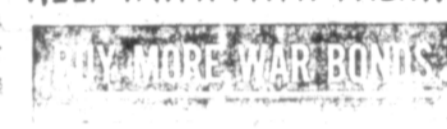

Tests For High School Pupils Planned

Oregon will have a high school testing program, related to college entrance, comparable to that developed in Ohio under the leadership of Ray G. Wood, recognized testing specialist, if a plan drawn up by the high school relations committee of the state system of higher education is approved by the secondary school executives in their October conference.

The plan has just been approved by the state board of higher education which an appropriation to start the program, contingent upon the acceptance of the plan by the state's high school leaders.

Dean E. B. Lemon, chairman of the high school relations committee, says the program contains three main features. One calls for a general test for high school seniors applying for state board tuition scholarships, rather than basing selection entirely on high school record and recommendations.

A second provision is for a subject-matter test in basic fields to be given at the end of the junior year to those contemplating college, thus, giving time to cor-

rect deficiencies that may appear. A third feature is a general ability test to measure capacity and adaptability for college training.
